For the second time within three months, Tabor City and the surcunding countryside was rocked by terrific explosion early yesterday morning when a combination service station and residence across the South Carolina line in Horry County was blown to bits. The blast occurred about 3 o'clock.

As a convenience to the farmer and the cannery personnel at auction on Tuesday with J. L. it is most important that appoint- Baxter and sons buying the Baldments be made several days in ad-

vance. The cannery will operate as many days per week as necessary. As the number of persons canning meat is increasing and the process being new to some, it might be well to consider several important points, Mr. Huggins said. It is very essential in securing a satisfactory meat product to use absolutely fresh meat from animals that are healthy and have been butchered and handled in a sanitary manner. Do not feed the animal for 18 to 24 hours before butchering, but give plenty of water. Carcasses should be washed with cold water, wiped dry with cloth and chilled rapidly after dressing, but not allowed to freeze. Before canning it is essential for the meat to be free of animal heat and freezing temperatuer causes a frozen crust to form on the outside of the meat thus holding the animal heat around the joints. The desirable temperature for cooling meat is 34 to 40 degrees. Poultry should be chilled from six to twelve hours and beef for 48 hours.
