UMSTEAD WINS RACE FOR GOVERNOR

William B. Umstead of Durham will become North Carolina's Governor next January.

Representative F. Ertel Carlyle possible run-off with Mayor Joe Tally of Fayetteville for his scat in Congress.

These were the major developments from the standpoint of local interest, in Saturday's Democratic primary.

Umstead scored a 25,000-vote victory over his opponent, Hubert E. Olave, and Carlyle had to come from behind to take a narrow 932-vote lead over his challenger. Tally.

Carlyle, however, failed to get a majority, since Ernest R. Mayhau of Wilmington got close to 2,000 votes.
