Prime Minister Churchill, speaking in the House of Commons, and his defense minister Earl Alexander, addressing the House of Lords, have told Britain that the enemy in Korea has nearly doubled his strength and can now launch a major offensive at any time and sustain it over a long period. Churchill also said he never believed the Reds wanted peace, even when the truce talks started last July.
