Republicans, Independents, and Democrats feel a sharp sense of well-being in the nomination of Dwight D. Eisenhower for President.

A surge of confidence has swept the country.

The people of this Nation—who are first Americans, and then Republicans or Independents or Democrats—listening intently, heard with satisfaction the words of the Republican candidate for President: "You have summoned me on behalf of millions of your fellow Americans to lead a great Crusade—for freedom in America and freedom in the world . . . I will lead this Crusade."

These words were good words to the ears of Americans. They were in contrast to the chant of Administration hucksters:

- There is no reason to fear Communism. We are in no danger. (While Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Poland, Rumania, China, fell to Communism—while 100,000 Americans died or were wounded in Korea.)
- There is no Communism in Government. (While Alger Hiss and others were about their chosen work.)
- There is no corruption in Government. (While headlines blazoned the names of Government officials arrested and indicted.)
- There is no drift toward Socialism. (While the very factor of States' Rights has become the primary target of the Truman regime.)

To the American people, General Eisenhower declared: "Wherever I am, I will end each day of this campaign thinking of millions of American homes, large and small; of fathers and mothers working and sacrificing to make sure that their children are well cared for, free from fear, full of good hope for the future."

The people, listening on a note of anxiety, felt the throb of a new spirit bolstering up an old and beloved way of life.

They listened and were aware of a sense of well-being, of leadership in a time of crisis.

Garden Time

Last year in this column wrote briefly about two new icebox watermelons, the New Hampshire Midget and the Japanese Seedless varieties. Since this is watermelon season I wish to pass along a little more first-hand information on these melons.

This year the New Hampshire Midget has shown a serious weakness—a susceptibility to anthracnose disease which has killed most of the vines prematurely. I still like it for the home garden because of its small size—about the size of a small cantaloupe—and it is very prolific. Its flesh is rich red in color and is of good quality although it contains a lot of black seeds.

I grew the Japanese Seedless melon for the first time this year and am greatly pleased with it. It is considerably larger than the New Hampshire Midget, weighing normally about 10 to 12 pounds. The flesh is red and the quality excellent. There are a number of soft, undeveloped seeds present

but usually not more than a dozen fully developed seeds in any one melon—sometimes none at all. The fully developed seeds should not be saved because they will not come true. The original cross must be made each year in order to produce seeds which will produce "seedless" melons. Seed of the Japanese Seedless melon are expensive—about two cents per seed, but as they become popular the price should come down. It is necessary to plant a standard variety near it for pollination. If you like icebox melons, try the Japanese Seedless variety next year.
