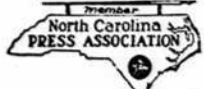

## A LITTLE FROM EVERYONE

In trying to rake and scrape up the money to build the building that will house the shirt and pajama factory, we have run into many pleasant incidents and many just as unpleasant. On the whole, the merchants of Tabor City have bent over backwards to buy as much stock in the corporation as they could afford to buy. This makes you feel good when you see wholesale cooperation for a project designed to help every business in Tabor City.

But as in all projects, some have held back from helping out any at all when obviously they could have been some help. This is the discouraging factor that often makes you wonder whether it's worthwhile to try to push a community project of this nature through to completion.

An industry with a consequential payroll in Tabor City will benefit one retail merchant about the same as it will another. The merchant who buys his shares of stock to put the industry over will benefit from the payroll no more than will the merchant who does nothing to encourage the industry. This is the factor that makes it so grossly unfair to those who do cooperate.

Tabor City has cooperated almost 100 percent on a lot of projects in the past. There are very few exceptions in this project but there are some. It is our opinion that every merchant who is able should do his part. To raise all the money that is necessary to build this building takes cooperation from everyone. It's unfair to the civic minded merchants for those who are un-civic minded to reap equal benefits but in this case such is true. With that being the case, we fail to see how any merchant can turn his back on the project and let his competitors do all the giving.

## THROUGH FOREIGN EYES

A while ago 14 Austrian coal miners visited this country under the Mutual Security Program. A Pennsylvania newspaper devoted a page of pictures and text to describing their amazement at the unbelievable living standards enjoyed by the American miners.

The Austrians couldn't believe at first that all the cars they saw parked near the pits belonged to the miners. They were astounded at the comforts and luxuries, ranging from refrigerators to TV sets, they saw in miners' homes. They were amazed to find that all you had to do to get hot water in one of these homes was to turn a faucet.

When an interpreter told them that the average American miner earned over \$18 a day the Austrians assumed he had made a mistake—that the \$18 was for a full week's work. They were dazzled by the welfare and retirement benefits our miners receive. And when the president of the coal company they were visiting passed by and said hello to a group of miners they thought they'd seen a miracle of democracy. It seemed even more miraculous when the president said, "Of course I speak to them. They're my friends. I play cards with them." It's still pretty much the rule in Europe that bosses are bosses and workers are workers and never the twain shall meet.

The Austrians saw something that too many Americans overlook. Under free enterprise—the much reviled capitalist system—labor has made the greatest gains in all history.

Bird hunting season always brings in about as many stories as fishing season. Some one is always coming around who has killed some phenomenal number of quail the day before or the week before. Hasn't been unusual to hear some one say "we killed 16 yesterday or last week me and so and so got 20 one day." Well such astronomical figures as those stagger our imagination. It's a mighty fine day for me if I kill four or five birds. Matter of fact, last Thursday was the only time I have been in this area this season and Billy Dorman and I got exact-

ly no birds. We managed to shoot three times during the afternoon to no avail and in general just couldn't find the birds to shoot at.

Of course, the people who have lived around Tabor City for longer than the five years that I have been here, know many, many more people who have land in the county that birds reside on. Now maybe they just naturally find more to shoot at when they go hunting and as a result they come in more heavily laden.

Course, the shooting has something to do with it. For me to bring in such a fabulous total as

But I still get a kick out of shooting in the general direction that the birds fly and after all my two dogs that I feed the year around need a workout now and then.

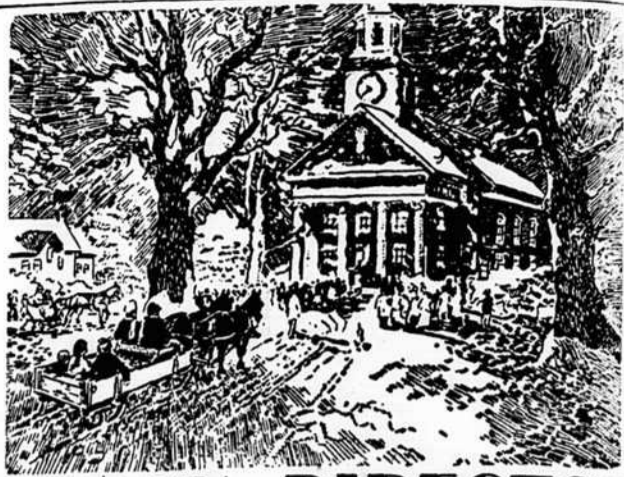
