Jaycee Recreation Committees Named

One of the most ambitious recreation programs ever planned here were pushed further along last night as the overall committee met and appointed committees for the various phases of the Jaycee program.

With tentative plans set by Jaycees to operate the program from June 20 through August 1, it will provide recreation and entertainment for adults as well as children.

Activities such as swimming classes at the millpond, church league softball games, little league baseball, an entry in the Whiteville Pony League, arts and craft projects for the smaller youngsters, and a "Youth Night" highlight the present plans.

The cost of the program is estimated at \$700. Prior to the Jaycees adopting the summer program, it was financed by soliciting funds from the merchants of the community.

"We hope to sponsor several fund raising projects to meet the expenses of the summer recreation program thus relieving the merchants of the financial burden," said Richard Gordon, president of the club.

Dave Diamond, athletic director at Tabor City High School, has been instrumental in mapping the program and will lead his assistance in setting up the various phases of recreation. Coach Diamond will serve several weeks at Camp Pla-Mor at Windy Hill Beach but is expected to be here to supervise the program during its six weeks operation.

Appointed to committees last night were Claude Boyd and Don Prince, purchasing committee; Kenneth Ray and Harry Dunnigan, organization of church league baseball; Ed Wright and Joe Evans, organization of Pony League entry; Howard Harrington and Joe Coleman, setting up swimming classes; Junior Stevens, erecting of swings and repairing of lights on the recreation grounds; Al Harrison, accepting applications for supervisors on playgrounds; Tom Garrell and Dr. Gene Cook, organizing "Adult Night"; Harold Ward and Erskine Young, organization of "Youth Night."

Reports on the progress of the committees will be made Tuesday night when Jaycees hold their installation services at the Pee Dee Lodge.

Installation of new Jaycee officers will be held Tuesday night, May 3, at 8:15 o'clock at the Little P. E. Lodge.

Al Harrison will succeed Richard Gordon as president while Erskine Young will be installed as the new vice-president. Tabor City's outstanding man and woman of the year will be recognized at a joint meeting of all civic clubs tentatively set for Friday night, May 13.

W. Horace Carter, owner of the Atlantic Publishing Company said today that the TABOR CITY TRIBUNE would present trophies to the outstanding man and woman of the year for their contribution to civic activities.

This marks the first time in two years that such awards have been made. Firemen Train In Use Of New Truck

New interest was created in the local volunteer fire fighting unit last night as members attended an instructional class on the operation of the new fire truck which arrived here Friday.

Approved several months ago by the local Board of Commissioners, the \$8900 LaFrance fire truck was delivered by Roy Harper, who made the trip to Elmira, New York, and drove the truck to Tabor City.

H. E. McCoy, field engineer, and William Morgan, sales representative of the American LaFrance Foamite Corporation, spent several hours last night instructing the local fire fighters in the use of the new truck. Another session is set for tonight.

Purchasing the fire truck marks another step in providing ample fire protection for residents of Tabor City. Recently the fire department roster was revised and only members who had proved their desire to serve regularly were retained.

Town commissioners have expressed belief that the new truck will adequately serve the fire fighting needs of the community. Its main features, compared to the truck which had been in use for 17 years, are an increase in horse power, an extra overdrive transmission for pumping water, an improved centrifugal force which puts out 500 gallons of water per minute, a 300 gallon auxiliary tank and a centrally located control system. The pumps have high pressure characteristics giving high pressure fog in fighting gas and oil fires. Also, it has two booster reels and high pressure hoses and nozzles.

"We are happy to have been able to purchase this new truck. It was badly needed and would have been purchased sooner; however finances would not permit such action. I believe the protection now afforded by the new truck and volunteer fire fighting unit is highly adequate to cope with any fire problem," said Mayor W. Horace Carter.

Movement Begins To Obtain Rural Phone Service

M. M. Jones, principal of the Old Dock-Nakina school, has been named chairman of the area committee which is making a concentrated drive to secure telephone service for residents in the Southern and Southwest portions of Columbus County.

In a meeting held Friday night at Nakina, a large group heard Marion Shuffler, representative of the North Carolina REA's telephone division, outline the details of securing phone service.

The area committee will seek applicants for the proposed telephone system.

Approximately 500 persons are expected to sign up for the telephone service. The committee appointed Friday night will begin immediately to solicit applicants.

The telephone service would be built by a cooperative using funds borrowed from REA, similar to the construction of REA power facilities.
