

# Floyd Explains Pearsall Plan

W. F. "Bill" Floyd, Columbus County member in the North Carolina House of Representatives, continued his work today of awakening voters to the need for expressing their approval of the Pearsall plan amendments when they vote in Saturday's special election.

Floyd is slated to make two radio addresses Friday on the "Pearsall" amendment. He will speak over WTAB at 10:15 a. m. and over WENC at 5 p. m. "I am unalterably opposed to the mixing of the races in our public schools. It has been proven and it is only natural that a child is happier and more sensitive to learning in the confines of his own race, in his own school," said Floyd in support of the Pearsall plan.

The Pearsall Amendment will not go into effect and means absolutely nothing unless and until there is some attempted mixing of the race in some school in this state.

The amendment provides that any child for whom no public school is available, or who is assigned against the wishes of his parents to a public school attended by a child of another race, and cannot reasonably be reassigned to a public school not attended by a child of another race, may receive a grant of State and local funds to be used in obtaining and education in a private school. The Bill also provides that the Board of Education in any community may subdivide the administrative unit into local areas and submit to the registered voters in any area the choice of whether they want to continue or suspend operation of public school or schools in that local area.

Floyd said, "The Pearsall Plan does not rule out the possibility of some integration in some public schools in this State. It does, however, guarantee every parent in this state, white or Negro, that their child shall not be forced to attend a mixed school."

He further illustrated his point by giving a hypothetical case. It is as follows: "Suppose three negroes of high school age, residing in Whiteville, applied for admission in Whiteville High School, and let's further suppose that their admission was denied by the Whiteville Board of Education. If the students, or their parents, or the NAACP were determined to see it through, they would next have to appeal, three separate suits, to the Superior Court. If this procedure ran true to form, there would be considerable delay of time and considerable expense involved before the cases would be heard, and inevitably the appeals would be denied. The next step would be an appeal to the State Supreme Court.
