Good Shepherd Home Anniversary Plans Completed

The Good Shepherd Home located at Lake Waccamaw will observe its first anniversary Saturday and Sunday, July 13 and 14, with a Homecoming program.

Special services will be held in the Hillsboro Methodist church, the home church of the Rev. E. D. Dunn, director of the Good Shepherd Home. The anniversary services will be held Saturday at 8 p. m. and Sunday at 11 a. m. with guest speakers participating.

Dinner will be served to the men who have been patients at the home, and their guests Saturday at 6:30 p. m. and again Sunday following the morning service.

Reservations for visitors have been made at Lake Waccamaw, Hillsboro and other surrounding communities.

Since the opening of the home July 10, 1956, a total of 241 men have been patients at Good Shepherd. The results have been very encouraging in that 140 of those who have really found that the Christian Way of Life is the life and are living daily as the Lord would want them to be, said the Rev. Dunn.

The Good Shepherd Home is a Christian home for alcoholics, chartered by the department of the State of North Carolina. Alcoholics are received into the home regardless of financial status, creed, or denomination. The only requirement is that the man come of his own free will seeking help for his problem and no charges are made.

The program at the home for the men consists of physical, educational and recreational rehabilitation and a follow up method to help train and secure a job which insures a large percentage of success, the Rev. Dunn emphasized.

Officials of the Good Shepherd prefer that the alcoholic stay at the home for a period of eight weeks.

Irene Anseume Will Complete Course Aug. 3

Irene Bell Anseume, of Columbus County Health Dept., is taking special work in public health this summer at the University of North Carolina School of Public Health.

The course, Special Fields in Public Health Nursing, began July 8 and will continue through Aug. 2. The four-week course is divided into four sections of a week each. One week will be devoted to each of the following subjects: cancer control, July 8-12; tuberculosis control, July 15-19; chronic diseases, July 22-26; and communicable diseases, July 29-Aug. 2. Approximately 95 students are registered for each section of the course. The course requires less than two hours of classwork.

The purpose of the course is to give professional education to public health nurses who are engaged in public health and institutional work.

Mrs. Anseume has enrolled in the course for all sections of the course. This work is being offered by the Department of Public Health Nursing of the UNC School of Public Health.

The UNC School of Public Health is the fourth oldest professional school of its kind in the United States and one of 10 such schools in North America accredited by the American Public Health Association.

Surviving are the parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Causey; six brothers, W. B. Causey, James Causey, Frank Causey, Roy Causey and Clarence Causey; of Conway; two sisters, Mrs. Junior Drew of Marion and Mrs. Calvin Flowers of Wilmington, N. C.

There seems to be considerable difference of opinion concerning the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division between the Dillon county Grand Jury and the Horry County Grand Jury.

In Horry county where the sheriff's department is under federal investigation, SLED agents entered the county and conducted some kind of investigation in the presence of the sheriff. In Dillon county, where another subject was under investigation, they failed to even notify the sheriff.

The Dillon county episode involved a situation in which SLED sought to gather evidence against Lloyd Page on some kind of bribery charge. Page denied the charges of SLED and the Grand Jury did not indict him.

On the other hand, the Dillon Grand Jury sent a protest letter to Governor George Bell Timmerman asking him to reprimand the SLED officers for the manner in which they conducted the investigation.

They specifically asked the Governor to take appropriate action also against the Charlotte Observer's reporter who accompanied SLED during the questioning of Page and apparently led the man under investigation to believe that he was an officer.

The newspaper reporter in question is H. H. May, a close friend of SLED Agent Dan Beckman who conducted the Horry investigation. But the agents would not name him even under oath before the Grand Jury.

May, who has said he did not believe the Horry county sheriff's department was guilty of a white whiskey conspiracy or collusion between the sheriff, Beckman and the juke box company, impounded Beckman and May's car while Page was being questioned in Dillon county.

The Horry County Grand Jury apparently took the word of SLED agents in preference to other evidence presented to them in the recent session in which the sheriff's department investigation was considered. That session resulted in a clean bill of health for the sheriff's force.

SLED Agent Beckman appeared before the Horry Grand Jury in March and in June.

The full text of the Dillon county Grand Jury letter to the governor follows:

Honorable George Bell Timmerman, Governor of the State of South Carolina, Columbia, South Carolina

We, the members of the Grand Jury of Dillon County wish to record protesting the manner in which two members of the Law Enforcement Division acted while carrying out an assignment in Dillon County whereby we believe that they overstepped their authority, and also cast unwarranted reflection on the sheriff of Dillon County and his deputies, in the following actions. A. Whereby they carried out an investigation in Dillon County, without consulting the Sheriff of this county or any of his force, and upon the solicitation of a "Citizen," whom one of the SLED men, appearing before the Grand Jury under oath, refused to name.

B. Whereby these two members of the SLED accompanied by a newspaper reporter for the Charlotte Observer took a citizen of Dillon County into custody, and questioned him, in the presence of this reporter with his reporter taking an active part in the questioning.

C. Whereby these two members of SLED did also interrogate at least three members of the county Board of Commissioners in the presence of the said newspaper reporter, and led every one of these members of the Board of Commissioners to believe that the reporter was also a member of SLED, and allowed the reporter to take part in the questioning.

D. Whereby, we believe that these two members of the SLED aided and abetted this same newspaper reporter in the conscious or unconscious impersonation of an Officer of the SLED.

Therefore, we the members of the Dillon County Grand Jury respectfully request that the said members of the SLED be censured for their actions, that a public apology should be forthcoming to the Sheriff of this County, and that whatever appropriate action that your Honor deems proper to be taken in respect to said newspaper reporter in any future work or activity of the SLED.
