If the New York weather is any worse than that experienced here in the last week, we certainly don't envy him on this journey.

PROMOTION: Next week the big Brunswick County Appreciation Days sale begins in Tabor City. There are going to be \$300 given away on February 9, 10 and 11, on a new gimmick that evolves around numbers on the front of each of the special section that we are mailing out. This is a complete giveaway. There's not a thing to buy, not a rhyme to write, no tickets issued—this is strictly a giveaway of \$300, and we are anxious to see how many folks will bring those numbers back to Tabor City and get their free money. While the three big days of promotion are entitled "Brunswick County Appreciation Days," the money that will be given and the values that will be on hand in local stores are designed to appeal to the entire public regardless of where they live. Some of the free money will go to persons on routes other than Brunswick County but a large portion of the lucky numbers will be in Brunswick. Merchants want to show the folks of the neighboring county that they appreciate their trading in Tabor.

NO ERROR: Ken Lovell has been putting out bumper stickers on autos reading "Trade In Tabor" and it's got a great deal of comment. Several folks have said that the printer must have forgotten to put the "City" on the sticker. But such is not the case. We printed the stickers and when you say "Tabor" folks in these parts know where you are talking about. We believe the advertising value was greater as the sign read then if it had had "City" on it. Consequently, we have printed another batch of these stickers and they read just like the last group except they say, following the "Trade In Tabor" line, "You'll Be Glad You Did." And that's the truth too. This is another project of the Merchants Association that directors hope will help bring more and more customers to town.

Some individual merchants are also promoting the Trade In Tabor theme with book matches that carries their own advertising message and then puts in the general plug for Tabor City.

TAXES: Mrs. Nellie Spivey, the local tax collector, reports that quite a number of new tax properties have been put on the books this year. This is always a healthy situation showing growth and the additional tax revenue can certainly be used by the town and county governments.

4-H FUND: Only six Tabor City business firms to date have contributed to the county wide drive for funds for the 4-H Development organization designed to provide scholarships to needy and deserving 4-H club boys and girls. Columbus County has a quota of \$7800 and to date only \$1063 has been received. Loblolly, White Pine Seedlings Available

COLUMBIA — Orders for loblolly and white pine seedlings are still being taken by the S. C. State Commission of Forestry, according to State Forester Chas. H. Flory.

Approximately 3 million trees are available from the total of 156 million trees which were grown in the Forestry Commission's four forest tree nurseries.

Orders are being accepted for loblolly and white pine only. The supply of other types of pines, as well as red cedar and yellow poplar, has already been exhausted.

Orders can be placed with county agents, county rangers, district foresters, SCS offices, ASC offices, teachers of vocational agriculture, or directly with the S. C. State Commission of Forestry, P. O. Box 357, Columbia, S. C.

Weekend Wrecks Group Visits Swift Plant, Bill Hooks Is Best "Grader"

Tabor City's weekend wreck scene: three accidents, two hospitalized, and one citation issued.

On Friday at 6:25 p. m., a 1960 Volkswagen driven by Doler Dawson Spivey, 66, of Tabor City, collided with a 1960 Ford operated by Ted Graham, a 24-year old Loris man.

According to Officer Ted Watts' report, the Volkswagen was going south on NC 410 while the Ford was being driven north on the road. The two vehicles made contact at the intersection of Lewis Street and 410.

Spivey was carried to Loris Community Hospital where he is being treated for head and face injuries. A passenger, Luvinia Spivey, was also hospitalized with head, leg and arm injuries.

The first of two wrecks to occur here Saturday was at 6 p. m. and also on 410. A 1956 pickup driven by James Sylvester Williamson, 20, Loris Rt. 1, was proceeding north as a 1960 Plymouth driven by Melva Dean Wright was headed north and collided. Also being driven north and involved in the accident was a 1960 Ford pickup driven by Austin Gore, Rt. 2, Tabor City.

The Williamson pickup was damaged on the right side, and the Wright vehicle on the left side; the pickup driven by Gore was damaged on the left-rear bumper.

Only Williamson was cited. Around 10:30 Saturday night, a 1960 Corvair driven by John Edward Stevens southward on the Stake road, and turned left and was struck by a 1957 Ford operated by Jesse Eldredge of Clarendon.

The Corvair was damaged at the right-rear, and the Ford on the right-front fender.

Neither Stevens, 19, nor Gore, 21, were injured.

According to the police department, investigations of the three wrecks are not yet complete.

A group of Columbus County swine producers visited Swift & Company Plant in Wilson, N. C., where the plant, headed by Mr. F. H. Peters, gave a demonstration on grading hogs. Mr. Peters was assisted by Jack Kelly, Extension swine specialist, N. C. State College in Raleigh.

After the grading demonstration the group from Columbus and Hoke Counties was asked to grade ten hogs on Swift's grading system where they estimated the backfat, length and grade. Billy Hooks from Columbus County won a ham for being the best hog grader from the two counties. The plant manager showing why they prefer the meat type hog to the "old time" fat hog and why it was more profitable to both farmer and packer for them to buy meat type hogs.

One of the federal inspectors discussed their part in consumer protection and explained how all hogs were inspected both in the pen and on the killing floor. Unfortunately, the veterinarian said it was a lead of hogs from Columbus County that was the worst load of hogs from a parasite infestation that they had had this year. He showed several carcasses that were infested with kidney worms and had been condemned.

After a trip through the plant where they were killing and packing meat, the group left for Sampson County where they visited the swine farm of Mr. James Wright Jackson who keeps a heard of 65 to 80 brood sows and operates his own farm feed mill.
