During the regular season the Red Devils whipped the Chadbourn team twice, a fact which provides hope for the Tabor teammates.

In closing out the regular season the Devils were matched against a team of alumni which handed them a 66-49 defeat. High scorer for the alumni Ronald Wray with 15 points; high for the Red Devils

was Roger Small with nine points; highest scorer for the Red Devils was Eula Arnette with 16 points per game.

For a wrap-up of the season the Red Devils have won three games and lost 16, the leading scorer of the season was Roger Small with 262 points, an average of 14.6 points per game. Eula Arnette was third leading the Devillettes with 260 points, an average of 13.6 points per game. Carrie Jean Wray was second with 164 points and Jackie Small third with 162.
