DHS History Recalled By PTA President

Mrs. Bessie Johnson WICC. "It seems that it was only yesterday that I was a student here," remarked Mrs. Bessie Johnson to members of the Douglas school's Parent-Teachers Association recently.

"The progress has been wonderful," those gathered for the Founder's Day observance were told. "We now have one of the most fabulous plants I have ever been in," said Mrs. Johnson.

After recognizing W. A. Ware, principal, the president, Mrs. V. S. Singletary, members and guests, the speaker recalled the history of the school's PTA and the beginning of the school in 1916.

"In 1916 there was no school here for Negro children. Nine of our energetic parents got together and decided that these children should have an education," she recalled, continuing, "After investigation it was found that in order to have a state-paid teacher, we would need at least 30 students. This we didn't have."

Local parents decided to pay for the first teacher themselves. This action came about after the encouragement of Rev. J. E. Green (the first Negro to live in Tabor City and also the first to own an automobile here), as well as Singletary, Gerald and Joe Gerald who came to Conway, S. C., to bring the first teacher to the town, Mrs. Johnson said.



Our first officers were: Mrs. Mary E. Pierce, Philadelphia, Pa., president; Mrs. Sarah L. Graham, (deceased) secretary; and Rev. G. E. Greene (deceased), treasurer. There were 43 members with the joining fee 10c, \$430 was raised. Various committees of the P. T. A. were appointed. The P. T. A. was "Better School." The P. T. A. since that time has never gone down, although not well-attended sometimes. There are a few of the outstanding people left. If I had the opportunity to say who are our founders, I would name Mrs. Callie White, M. Sarah Greene, Mrs. Helen Gause, Mrs. Gassie Chestnut, Mrs. Rena Williams, and Mr. Ozzie Langston now of Conway, South Carolina," she said.

"May I say to you, if you are not a member of our local P. T. A. join at our next meeting," she continued.

"All great men may not be organizers but all great men belong to an organization. All things that are done together are done well. Was it not God who said, Let us make man in our image and likeness?"

"And Jesus being pleased with organization asked the disciples to bring him the little ones, and he said, Let him who is little as one of these and I will receive him. With this he fed a multitude and had plenty left."

Said Mrs. Johnson: "On our 29th birthday, keep this thought with you - If you think you are too small to do a big job, try doing a small job first."

"Persons do not have to pay anything to register," said Boyd. "Both children and adults may register, and there will be a container for both age groups."

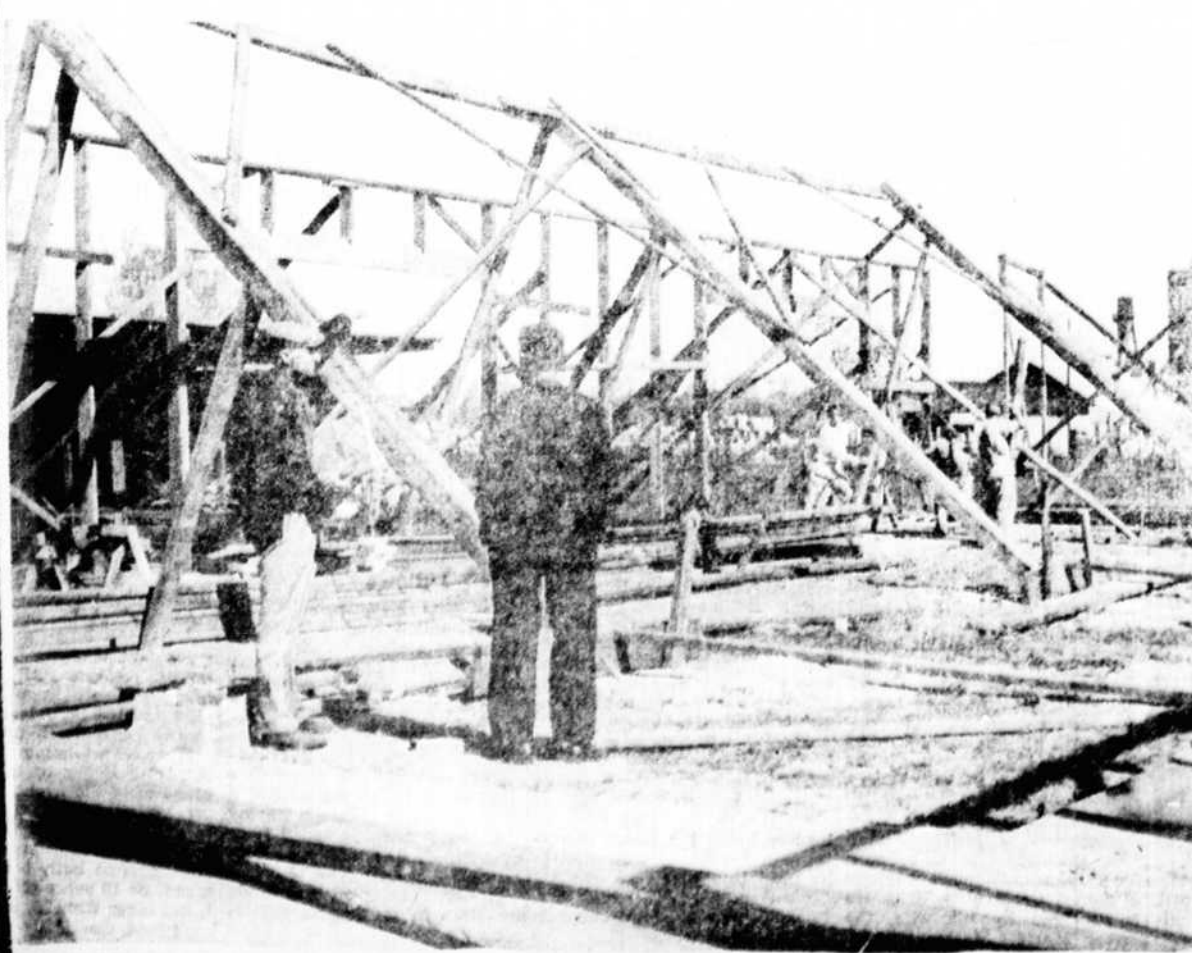
Sarvis Host At Convention Breakfast

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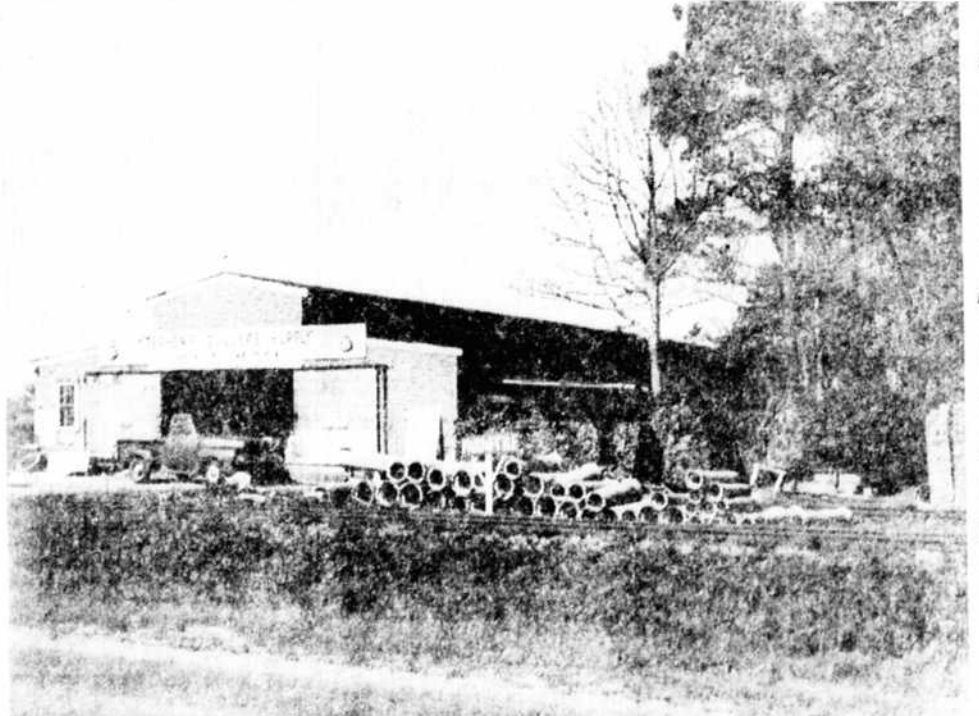
