## Police Chief Warns Against "Go-Cart" Use

Numerous complaints have prompted Police Chief Jesse Barker to issue a stern warning to those persons who are driving "Go-Carts" on town streets.

In addition to the violation of the law, the Chief stresses the danger involved in operating undersized vehicles on streets where drivers of automobiles are not accustomed to seeing them.

"In most cases, operators of the carts are young boys," Barker said. "Their parents are responsible for the violation."

## Leaf Prices Remain High

Tobacco on the Tabor City Market continues to sell high, with Monday's average standing at \$69.03 for a total sale of 362,756 pounds.

Sales Supervisor Ken Lovell reported today (Wednesday) that at the end of this selling day, the volume of the 1961 market will exceed the total 9,200,000 pounds of last year.

Through Tuesday's sale, 9,114,000 pounds have been sold, and there is no indication that there is any shortage of tobacco for the floor.

Lovell said there is a possibility that the market here will close in the latter part of next week, but nothing official is now known.

"It's hard to judge," Lovell said. "The market is still good and the prices are still setting records, and I don't know of any reason why anyone should be considering a closing date as long as this keep up."

Lovell said there are many Horry County growers who have begun bringing their leaf to Tabor City due to the closing of the markets in Loris and Conway.

"We're glad to have them," he said. "We're treating them the same as if they had been bringing their crop here all during the market. We can get them the good prices."

## Tabor City To Get \$11,381 From Powell Bill Funds

Tabor City will receive \$11,381.27 in Powell Bill funds for use in non-highway system street work within the corporate limits for the coming year.

The State Highway Commission has announced that a check for the total amount will be mailed from Raleigh during the latter part of this month.

The total allocation for Columbus County participating towns is \$45,412.52.

The breakdown by towns: Bolton, \$3,466.32; Brunswick, \$665.00; Chadbourn, \$9,98.99; Fair Bluff, \$7,174.50; Lake Waccamaw, \$3,829.78; and Whiteville, \$20,292.93.

The allocations for funds are based on the 1960 census figures.

Previously, from the beginning of the Powell Bill in 1961, the census figures obtained in 1950 were used.

The population figure for Tabor City in the 1960 census stands at 2,338.
