Junior tackle Sammy Williams and senior halfback-end Leon Edward Fonvielle have been named to the first team in the Raleigh News and Observer's "All East 2-A" football eleven.

Williams was one of the defensive stars for the Devils. Fonvielle, though late getting out for football, proved to be a key man in the team's offensive punch, and was one big reason for the team's highly successful 6-3 season mark.

In all there are about 25 teams in eastern North Carolina 2-A football from which selections for the top spots are made.

Eleven selections make up the team. Names of other members were not immediately available.

Campaign Nears End; \$267,940 Pledged Total

The Coastal Carolina College Campaign for \$300,000 to give the college its own quarters on its own campus comes to an end Friday and workers are making an intense effort to put it over the top before that time.

Death Probe Of Old Dock Man Entered By SBI Investigator

An agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation has joined county law officers in an attempt to find the cause and other details surrounding the somewhat mysterious death of an Old Dock area man.

SBI Agent Frank Satterfield arrived Monday to assist Columbus County Sheriff Ben Duke, Coroner J. B. Long and other area investigators in the weekend death investigation of Davis Preston Williams, 57.

The discovery was made by Herman Watson, according to authorities, who had spent the night at the home of Leo D. Duboise, with whom Williams also resided.

An autopsy was performed by Dr. George Lumb, a Wilmington pathologist, on Sunday. The findings are not yet known.

Coroner Long said the body of the dead man bore numerous blisters that looked like bruises or burns.

According to information pieced together in the case authorities said that Duboise and Williams came home Friday night at about 7 o'clock.

Duboise said that he undressed Williams, treated the "burns" and put him to bed. He said that Williams did not say anything to him about how he had received the injuries.

Investigators are trying to determine where Williams was before returning home Friday night.

Two men have been arrested on charges of receiving stolen goods in connection with thefts totaling some \$5,000 by four teen-aged boys and a 23-year-old man, Horry County Police reported today.

County Police said Everett Hayes, respected Green Sea farmer, and Elks Ward, State Line night spot operator, were arrested on charges of receiving stolen goods. Magistrate Ben P. Harrelson at Green Sea said Hayes had posted \$1,500 bond and Ward bond of \$500.

Still in jail pending the posting of bond and the amount of bond required, police said, were Leamon Junior Floyd, 18, Rt. 3, Loris, \$4,500; Nevel Boone, 18, Finklee, \$1,500; and Robert Todd, 17, of Loris, \$5,000.

Charleston police are holding as suspect Frank Craven of Charleston in jail without privilege of bonds.

An autopsy was performed, but authorities so far have not ascertained the actual cause of death.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at the Inman Funeral Home Chapel at 11 a. m., and burial followed in the Mt. Zion cemetery. The Rev. Douglas N. Baker and Rev. Morgan E. Gilreath officiated.

TC Man Dies In Accident Monday Morn

An auto accident in rural Horry County took the life of Solon Soles, 62, of Tabor City at 7:30 a. m. Monday.

Mr. Soles was riding in an auto driven by his daughter, Mrs. Kathleen Jernigan, Rt. 4, Nichols, who on her way to work at the Tabor City Foods, drove off on a private side road to make a short visit at a neighbor's house. She failed to see a drainage ditch which served the road and her car plunged into the ditch.

Duiley Strickland, a witness, told County Coroner Littlejohn Blanton, that Mrs. Jernigan was driving at very slow speed and he was surprised to see her drive into the canal.

He immediately went to his car to the Loris hospital. Mr. Soles was dead on arrival.

Mrs. Jernigan is confined in the hospital. Blanton stated the death was accidental and no inquest will be held.

Survivors include two sons, Earl Soles of Tabor City and Horace Soles of the U. S. Army in Germany; seven daughters, Mrs. Nell Cribb, of Milwaukee, Wis.; Mrs. Marie Grooms of Denver, Colo.; Mrs. Doris Capps of Belton, Mo.; Mrs. Lula Mae Grainger of Loris, Rt. 1, Mrs. Annabelle Hedge of Whiteville, Rt. 3, Mrs. Kathleen Jernigan of Nichols, Rt. 4, and Mrs. Betty Butler of Loris; and twenty-six grandchildren.

Funeral arrangements have not been announced yet. The services will be held upon the return of Horace Soles, son of the deceased.
