Douglas Grad Patrols Sector Of Iron Curtain

BAD HERSFELD, GERMANY — Army Sgt. Edward L. Stephens, 31, whose wife, Adrienne, lives on Route 2, Phenix City, Ala., is serving with

the 14th Armored Cavalry Regiment's Reconnaissance Squadron which guards the northern sector of the East-West German border in Europe.

The members of Stephens' unit keep the border under constant surveillance through the use of jeep-mounted patrols and observation and listening posts.

Sergeant Stephens is assigned as a squad leader in the squadron's Troop L in Bad Hersfeld, Germany.

The sergeant entered the Army in 1954 and was stationed at Fort Jackson, S. C., before arriving overseas on this tour of duty in July 1961.

Stephens, son of Mrs. Bennie Stephens, 232 W. Second St., Tabor City, N. C., is a 1949 graduate of Douglas High School in Tabor City.

Oakdale Wins Community Contest

COLUMBIA — Oakdale Community of Clarendon county has been judged tops in this year's state-wide community development contest sponsored by electric power suppliers and the Clemson College Extension Service.

Officers of the winning community were among 600 guests assembled for a recognition

banquet today (December 12) at the Jefferson Hotel.

Under the leadership of Mrs. Mack Epps, president; J. M. Johnson, Jr., vice president; and Mrs. Shelby C'ntey, secretary — treasurer; Oakdale edged Monetta Club of Aiken county and Cooley Springs of Spartanburg to win a \$500 cash prize provided by Carolina Power and Light, Duke Power Company, and S. C. Electric and Gas Company.

Monetta, district winner for the Savannah Valley district; Cooley Springs, Piedmont winner; and Brightsville community of Marlboro county, Piedmont winner each were slated to receive \$250 cash awards from S. C. Electric Cooperatives, Inc. and member co-ops.

The Oakdale club mounted their prize-winning program last year. It included among the highlights the conducting of a community fair; using the community center as focal point of numerous and varied activities; constant improvement of the center; and 100 percent community participation.

Oakdale is 15 miles east of Manning and borders the Williamsburg county line and Elnek Creek. It is 10 miles south of New Zion, location of the nearest post office.

All 54 families in the Oakdale community are members of the club. Roughly three-fourths of the families are farmers. About one-fourth are
