MORGANTON — The 88th Congress will convene in a few weeks. From opening day until adjournment, the nation's 535 lawmakers will be engaged in the introduction of bills, daily committee meetings, and debate and action by the Congress. The pattern of prior legislative sessions indicates that it is almost certain that rules changes by the two Houses of Congress will be matters of concern during the forthcoming session. Senate Rule 22, which governs debate in that body, is expected to produce a battle over whether the Senate should allow less than two-thirds of those present and voting to cut-off debate on an item of legislation. The House may renew its discussion over the makeup of the 15 member House Rules Committee. After the determination of these procedural

matters well as the appointment of committees. Congress will begin its consideration of legislation.

Certain to be of primary concern at this session will be national security. Our recent firm action with respect to Cuba has lifted our prestige in the eyes of the world. However, I see no basic evidence that the Soviet bloc has wavered in its purpose to rule the free world. For this reason, it will be necessary for our nation to maintain an unassailable military position for the foreseeable future. Dissension among the Soviets and Red Chinese over Communist policies has not altered our need for strong military forces and armaments.

Taxation is almost certain to provoke more discussion at this session than any other single issue. Prior to the opening of Congress the President is scheduled to outline his views on economic matters confronting our nation. Already there are highly conflicting views on how tax cuts, tax reforms, and spending programs should be brought into agreement with anticipated revenues.

Since World War II mounting farm surpluses have created the 20th century farm problem in the United States. Vast strides in farm technology have created a vastly different farm situation in this nation from that faced in Soviet Russia and Red China. Our farm problem is overproduction of the U. S. and world markets while their concerns a growing underproduction. Wheat, feed grains, and cotton programs appear to be the main items on the farm calendar. American agricultural interests are so divergent that there are no ready solutions.

I did not need eyes to see their anxiety; I felt it; and realized the glassed-in area was a nursery, and the containers were to hold babies. Not wishing to intrude on the two men and one woman waiting there, I went back to my room. After breakfast I went again to the nursery. This time I paused to look at the babies in their little cribs. The lady, who had been waiting since early morning joined me, and I asked, "Do you have a grandbaby in there?" "Yes, he was born just a few minutes ago," she replied. "He is over there in that incubator, a big, beautiful boy, weighing over ten pounds. I have four granddaughters, but he is my only grandson. We are very anxious about his mother." Her anxiety did not hide her joy that her only grandson was born. She wanted me to know about him and to see him.
