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Twenty-five high school male seniors, nominated from counties in this area for consideration for Morehead Scholarships to the University of North Carolina, will be interviewed by the Morehead Scholarships District III Committee at the Gladen County Board of Education Building, Elizabethtown, January 12.

The 25 nominees from District III are being interviewed in a statewide competition with 156 boys from the other six Morehead Scholarship Districts in the state.

Morehead Scholarships provide a four-year all-expense-paid undergraduate college education to recipients. They were established in 1951 by John Motley Morehead, UNC graduate and native North Carolinian who lives in Rye, N. Y. Mr. Morehead is chairman of the John Motley Morehead Foundation.

Morehead Scholarship District III is composed of the following 15 counties: Bladen, Brunswick, Columbus, Cumberland, Duplin, Hoke, Jones, Moore, New Hanover, Onslow, Pender, Robeson, Sampson, Scotland, and Wayne.

Nominees for district interviews from Columbus County are: William Haywood Woodall of Whiteville and Paul Byron Wyebe Jr. of Hallboro.

Each of seven Morehead Scholarship District Committees will nominate six candidates who will be interviewed in Chapel Hill by the Central Morehead Scholarship Committee along with 32 nominees from 16 private preparatory schools on the Morehead Foundation's selected list. Those chosen as scholarship candidates will then be finally interviewed by the Board of Trustees of the Morehead Foundation.

Last year the trustee awarded 47 Morehead Scholarships. This year there are 153 Morehead Scholars—149 in residence at the University and four on leave. Of those on leave, one is performing military service; one is studying as a Göttingen scholar in Germany; one is the first UNC exchange scholar at the University of Poitiers, France; and one is doing a year's missionary work in Alaska.

Pedestrian safety is the responsibility of both the pedestrian and the driver. Highway Department officials stated, "Persons on foot should carefully obey all pedestrian safety rules and watch out for careless drivers. Drivers, on the other hand, should be on the lookout for careless pedestrians who may wander in front of their vehicles. Many persons seem to have the attitude that because they are on foot, they have the right-of-way. Highway Department officials warned, however, that pedestrians only have the right-of-way when crossing streets on proper traffic light signals, when in marked crosswalks or at other places especially designated for pedestrian use. Even though a pedestrian has the right-of-way, officials said, it is better to be safe than sorry, and it is much better to yield to a motor vehicle than be struck by one."

A few simple safety rules have been compiled for pedestrian use during this season. They are:

- (1) Cross streets only at intersections and with traffic light signals.
- (2) Where there are no sidewalks, walk on the left facing traffic.
- (3) At night, wear light-colored clothing or carry a light or white handkerchief.
- (4) When shopping, avoid carrying so many packages that they obstruct the view.
- (5) Watch for turning vehicles when crossing at intersections, even when you have the right-of-way.

## December Most Dangerous Time For Pedestrian

December, with its holiday season and busy shopping period, is the most dangerous time of the year for persons traveling on foot, the State Highway Department advises.

Almost every year, pedestrian deaths and injuries increase during the short days and long nights of December. Reasons for the increase include greater pedestrian activity when persons are shopping; during hours of twilight and darkness; pre-occupation with details of holiday preparations resulting in relaxed caution while walking; and greater exposure of children who try to squeeze in a few hours of outdoor play between school and darkness.

Pedestrian fatalities in South Carolina annually average about 20 per cent of the overall traffic death toll. Last year, 531 persons were killed while walking and 915 were injured. Larger percentages of pedestrian deaths occur among the age groups of the very young and the very old. During 1961, for example, 49 per cent of the persons under five years

old killed in traffic were pedestrians. Also, 62 per cent of these between the ages of five and 14 years and 36 per cent of those over 60 years old were pedestrians.

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Pedestrian safety is the responsibility of both the pedestrian and the driver. Highway Department officials stated, "Persons on foot should carefully obey all pedestrian safety rules and watch out for careless drivers. Drivers, on the other hand, should be on the lookout for careless pedestrians who may wander in front of their vehicles.
