Starbuck, Winston-Salem; G. H. Mills, R. G. Vaughan, and W. M. Combs of Greensboro.

The general secretary, J. W. Long, of Greensboro, made a report of the work from May 14, when he was elected, to date which showed that there had been a great deal of work done in the state during the year notwithstanding the fact that no one has been in the field the entire time Dr. C. W. Byrd, pastor of the West Market Street church, was made a member of the central executive committee, Rev. R. M. Andrews and Rev. Shuford Peeler, members of the general committee to fill vacancies. Harper, Prof. W. C. Smith, Prof. R. A. Merritt, N. B. Broughton and Rev. J. W. Long were appointed a committee on program for the state conven tion which meets in Greensboro in April, the exact date to be decided soon.
The new offices in the Banner building recently opened as head quarters of the association were visited by members of the commit tee and approved as a desirable home for the Sunday school cause of-North Carolina.
