## Where Many Were Killed In Omaha Tornado.

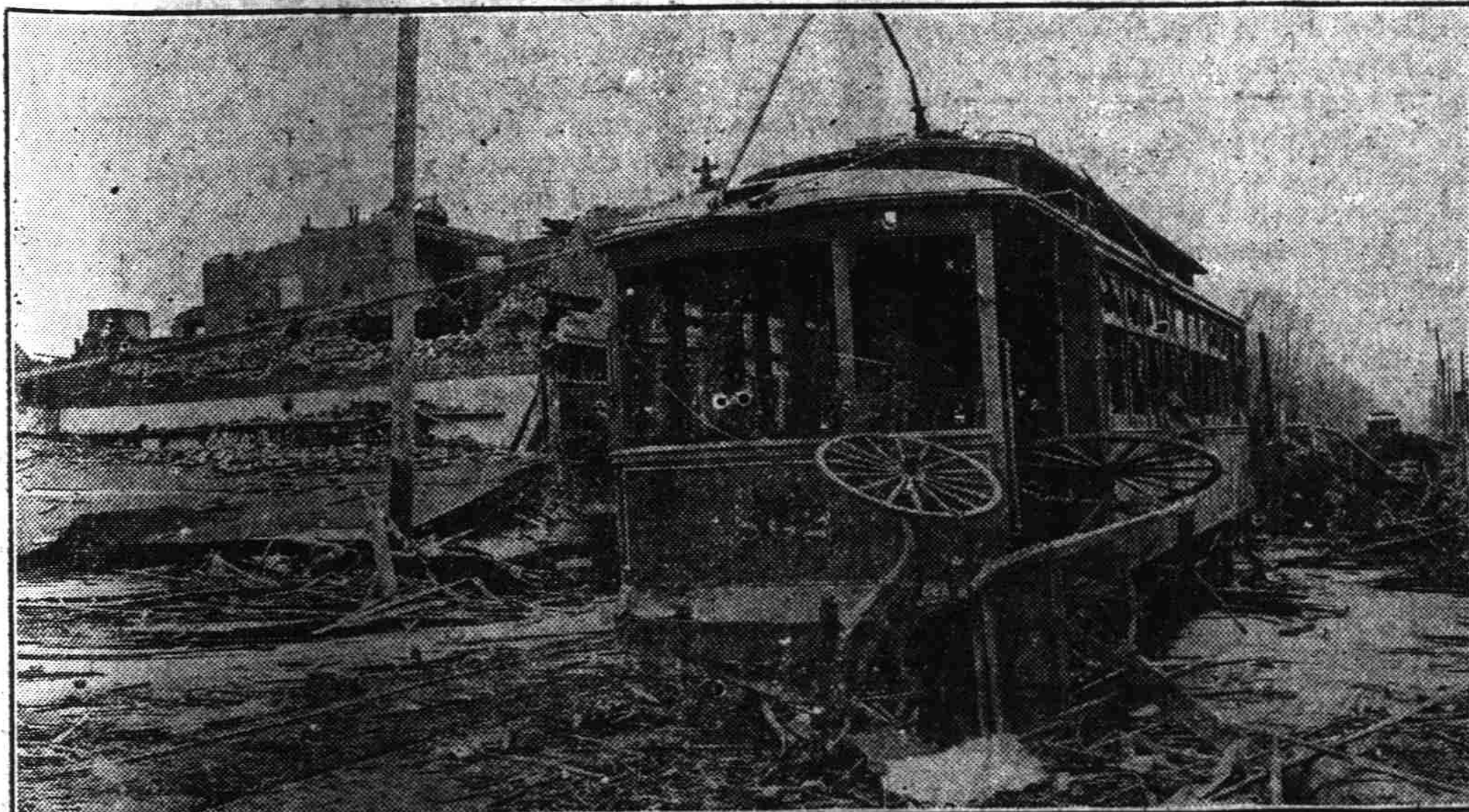

This picture shows the damage done at the corner of Lake and Twenty-fourth streets, Omaha. Twelve persons were killed here, several of them being passengers in the trolley car which was wrecked. Others died in the houses nearby which were demolished. This was directly in the heart of the storm's path.

## Houses Smashed by Dayton Flood.

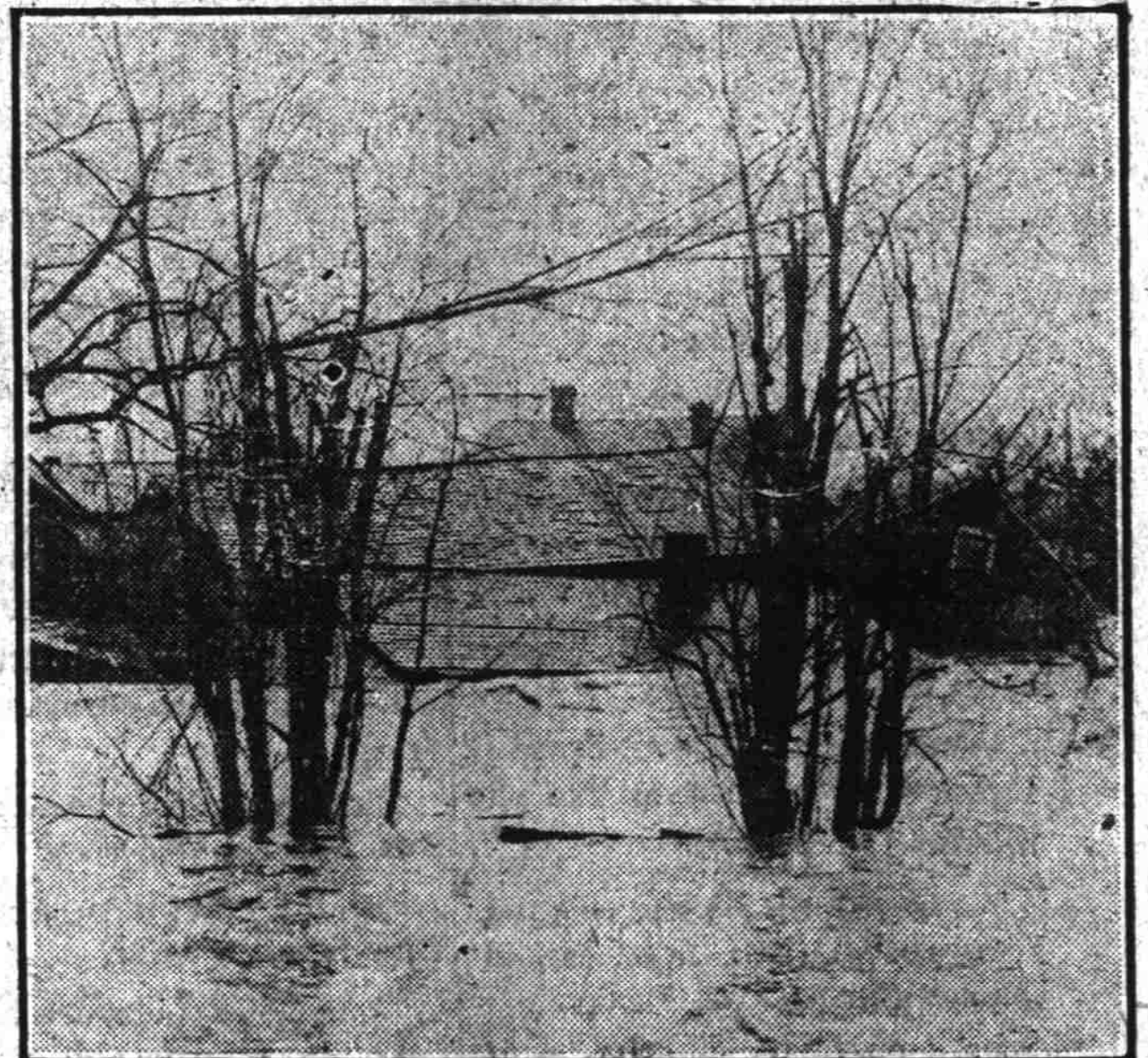
