The fraternal organizations throughout Western North Carolina are determined upon making "Brotherhood Day" (the second day of the Western North Carolina Fair to be held in Asheville on October 7, 8, 9 and 10) the greatest event ever experienced in their history.

Representatives from a number of the secret societies of Asheville in a meeting with the management of the Fair Association arranged a tentative program that will make "Brotherhood Day" replete with interest. A committee was appointed to invite a speaker of national reputation to deliver an address on this day, and a second committee was named to make arrangements for the occasion.

PACKAGES BY MAIL. C. O. D.

On the first of July the operations of the parcel post will be extended so as to cover a "collect on delivery" service. For this purpose a three-part coupon has been devised. The sender holds one, the second will be kept as a record at the sending office, and the third will be attached to the parcel. An elaborate system of blank sending and receipt form has been devised. Rural carriers will accept these C. O. D. packages for mailing. This "collect on delivery" service ought to add much to the popularity of the parcel post, but like the parcel post, itself, it is not going to be found anything like a work of philanthropy on part of a benign, but thrifty Government.—Charlotte Observer.
