On the first of July the operations of the parcel post will be extended so as to cover a "collect on delivery" service. For this purpose a threepart coupon has been devised. The sender holds one, the second will be kept as a record at the sending office, and the third will be attached to the parcel. An elaborate system of blank sending and receipt form has been devised. Rural carriers will accept these C. O. D. packages for mailing. This "collect on delivery" service ought to add much to the popularity of the parcel post, but like the parcel post, itself, it is not going to be found anything like a work of philanthropy on part of benign, but thrifty Government.-Charlotte Observer.
