WORK OF COMMISSION.

July 1.-Lively debates on the initiative and referendum increased pay for Legislators, additional taxation talk, and some legislation to abate the special legislation nuisance, occupied the commissioner's time today.

It was the best day of the session now finishing its seventh day's work. More matters were acted upon thanupon any former day. None of the discussions has been rancorous. It has been interesting throughout.

It became known today that the report made by the sub-committee on taxation exempting from taxation the income from property taxed, will be adopted.

The amendment to prohibit the Legislature from passing certain local, special, and private bills, passed its second reading, and will certainly appear in the final report of the final report of the commission to the Governor and the Legislature.

The initiative and referendum discustion was warm. The amendment passed its second reading after a resolution not to submit it at this time had been voted down. The vote was eight to seven. The debate on this was the feature of the meeting thus far, intellectually speaking.

The proposition to increase the pay of the Legislators from \$4 to \$6 a day and the presiding officers rom \$3 to \$10, passed its second reading by a vote of 14 to 1.

The proposal to change the election of members of the Legislature and the time of the Legislature's meeting from two years to four years, was defeated. There is no sentiment for this measure in the commission. The amendment to change and make easier the amending of the State constitution was voted down.
