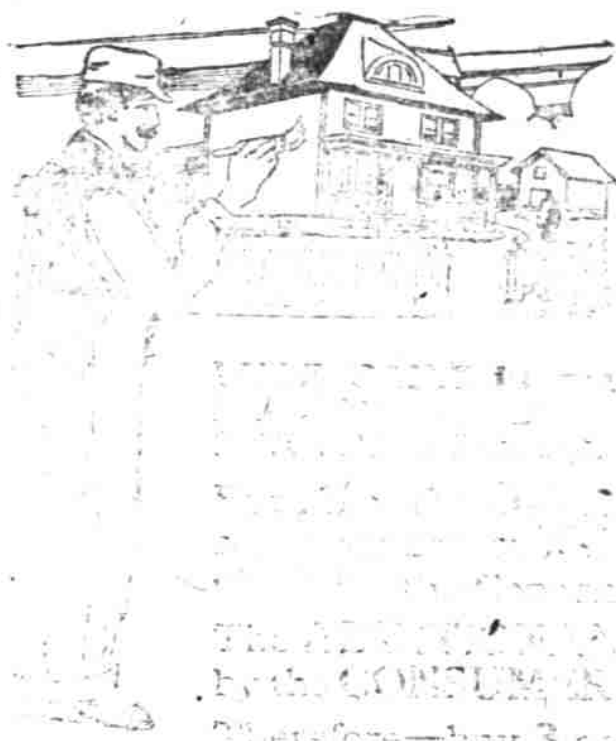

Chas. Bryson and family of Plain View Texas are visiting Mrs. R. M. Keller at her home at Cullowhee.

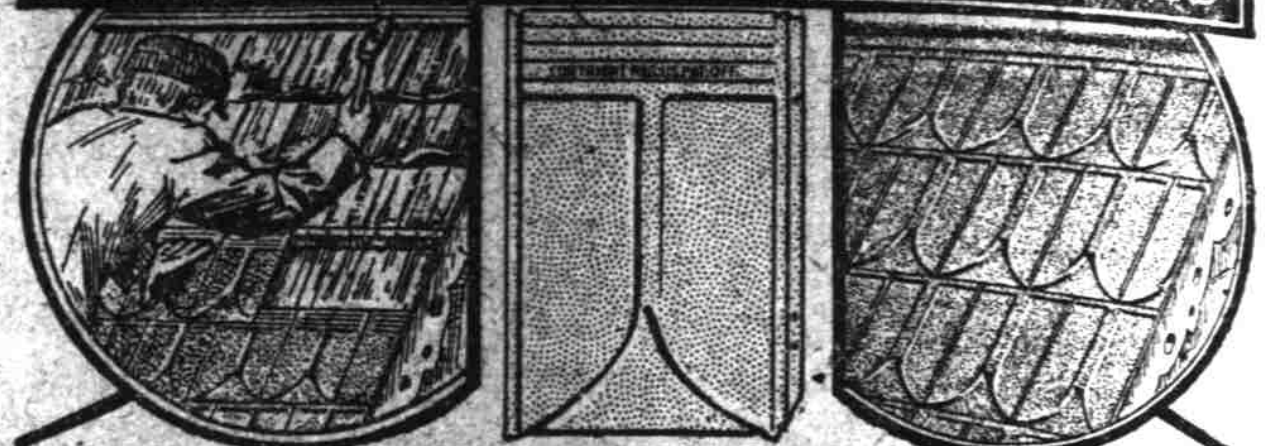
M. Buchanan is having quite a number of improvements made on the building occupied by the Journal and The Jackson County Stove Mica and Minning Co.

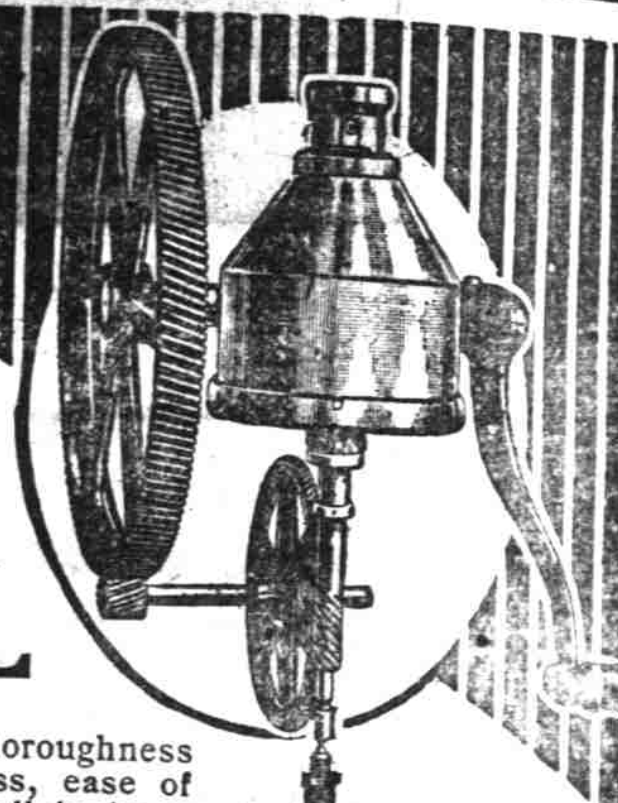

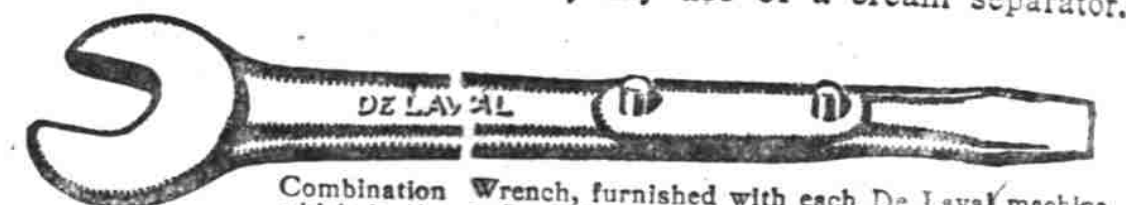
