This action has been taken because it has found that the Sanatorium could best be operated as a part of a comprehensive State policy in the prevention of tuberculosis. It is planned to devote a bureau in the State Board of Health offices to the subject of the prevention of tuberculosis. This bureau will take the form of a training school, or rather a correspondence school, in which the State Board of Health will endeavor to enroll every tubercular person in the State-The Sanatorium will be analogous to a central university, around which will be built up a great correspondence school.


