Another phase of the Farm Life School curriculum that has not been emphasized is teaching of proper methods of marketing the products of the farm. There is no question about the fact that the farmers do not get full value for the produce that they sell. The middle man is the fellow that makes the money. The consumer foots the bill and the farmer produces the food. Now the idea is the proper distribution of the products of the farm. If a farmer knows when to sell. To whom to sell. The right time to sell and how to prepare his commodities for the market he will realize the benefits of his labor. Co-operative marketing is the solution of the problem and plans for this system will be explained at the farm life school.

The winter is about over. The weather is fine for spring work on the farm and the boys are beginning to make things hum around the farm. There is every indication of an excellent crop and fruit year. The stuff will be made in Jackson County this year. Let's begin now to make an exhibit at the Fair this fall that will do justice to Jackson County. If we do that we will have done enough to open the eyes of the world to the possibilities in the soil of old Jackson.

The building of the 7 miles of road in Haywood, or not quite so much the building of the 16 miles in Jackson, necessary to form the connecting links in the continuation of the Greenville-Asheville Automobile Highway so that it will form a circuit from Greenville through Western North Carolina and back through Cashiers Valley into South Carolina, would be of more value to Jackson County than another railroad. Keep the idea in mind and talk it up.

Why not one of these delightful days before it gets too hot, take a day off and have a clean up day in Sylva? The Community Betterment Association, will no doubt take the matter up before long.

The "Cullowhee" a magazine published by the students of the Cullowhee Normal and Industrial School is one that shows thought and work. NOTICE

An election is hereby called to ascertain the will of the qualified voters of Jackson County as to establishing Farm Life School.

Whereas, a written request has been filed by the County Board of Education of Jackson County before this Board asking said Board of County Commissioners to order an election in Jackson County on the question of a Farm Life School as provided by law Chapter 84 Public Laws of 1911 section 7; and,

Whereas the said Board of Commissioners in their discretion have agreed to order said election.

It is therefore ordered by the Board that an election be held in the county of Jackson on the 14th day of April 1914 submitting to the qualified voters of Jackson County the question of levying and collecting a Special Tax on all takable property and polls of said county for the maintenance and equipment of a County Farm Life School therein and at such election those favoring the levying and collecting of such a tax for said purpose shall vote a ballot on which shall be written or printed the words "For County Farm Life School;" and those opposed shall vote a ballot on which shall be written the words "Against County Farm Life School."

And carry out said election as provided by law it is further ordered that a new registration of the qualified voters shall be had and that the following Judges and Registrars for the various voting precincts are hereby appointed as follows, to-wit:

Barkers Creek: For Registrar, Jim Messer; for Judges: Sam Brooks and J. R. Ensley.

Cullowhee: Registrar, W. N. Coward; Judges, J. A. Long and W. C. Norton.

Canada: Reg. R. M. Broom; Judges S. M. Melton, A. L. Owen.

Caney Fork: Reg. R. S. Green; Judges, J. M. Nicholson, W. A. Brown.

Cashiers: Reg. D. A. Bumgarner; Judges, C. G. Rogers and G. M. Cole.

Dillsboro: Reg. M. Y. Jarrett; Judges, H. R. Snyder, W. A. Enloe.

No bonds will be issued.
