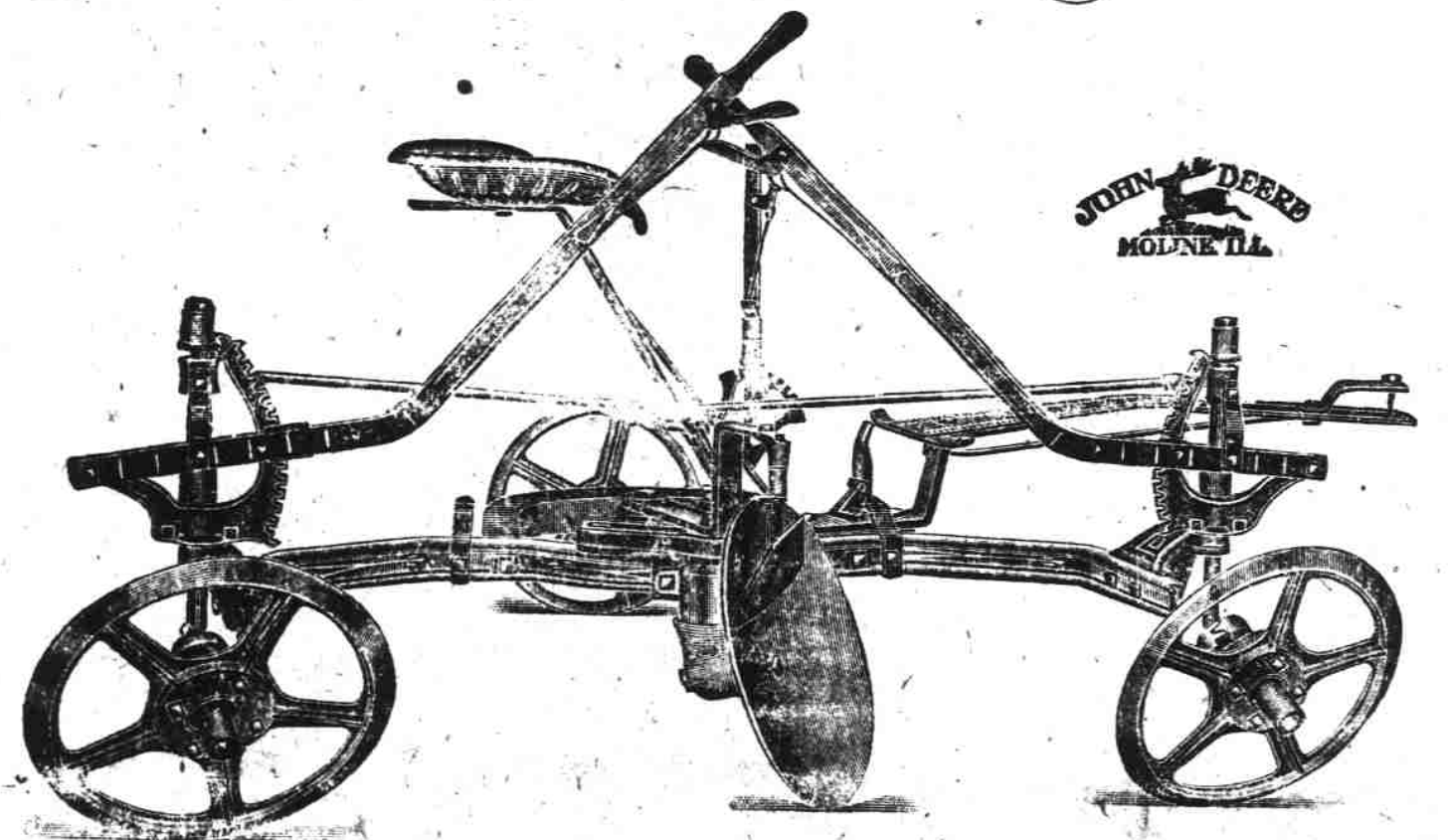

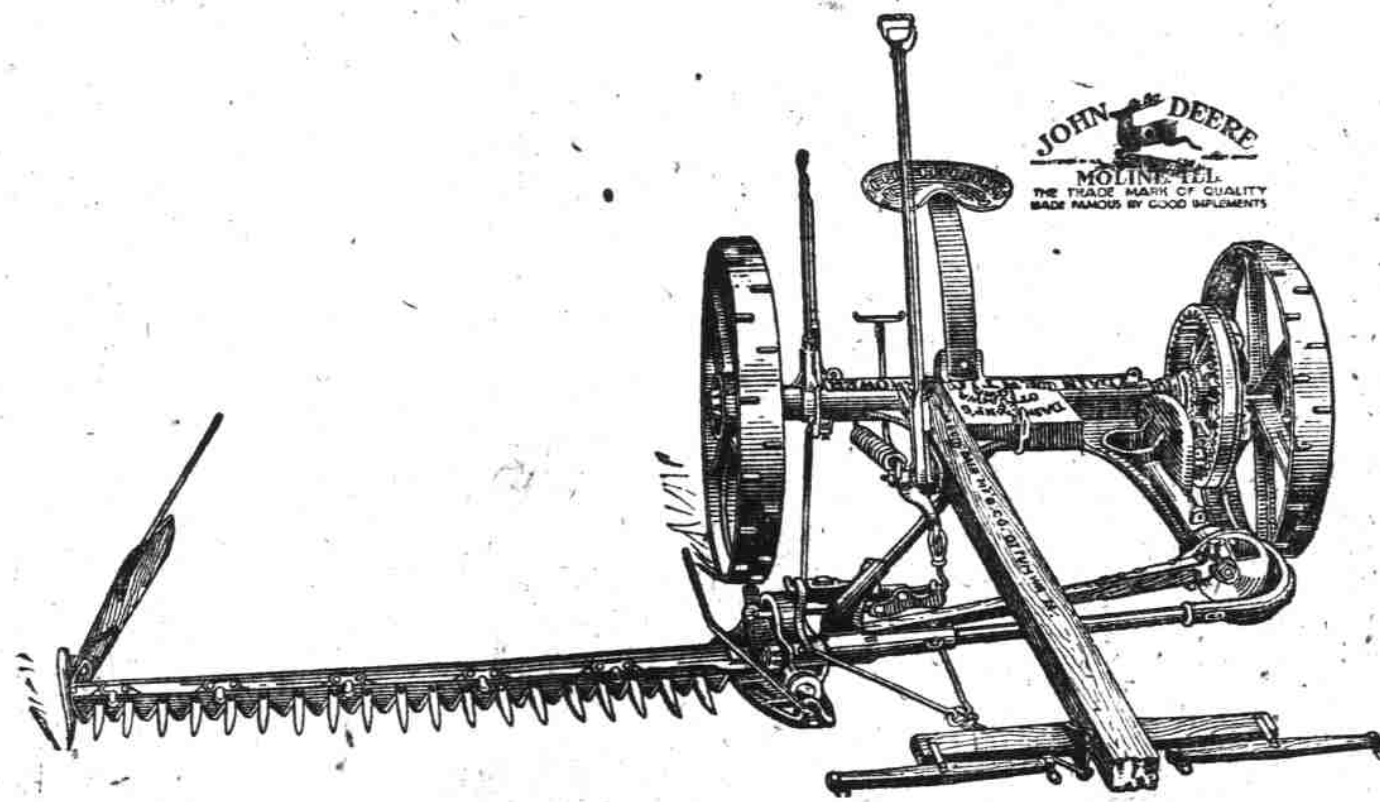


Model B Disc Harrow cuts every depth regardless of surface conditions

OBITUARY OF JOSEPH H. MOODY.

Brother Joseph H. Moody was born in Haywood county, on Jonathan Creek March 27, 1839. When he was very small his father moved to Waynesville where he died when his son was three years old. His mother moved to Alabama, where she died when her son was 13 years old. The boy lived there some time with an uncle, then was

brought back to Haywood county. At the age of nineteen he was married to Miss Arty B. Crawford, sister to Uncle Jimmy Crawford of Sylva.

They made their home at Balsam for about 12 years, then moved to Barkers Creek. They raised three children, Ellen, Dovey and Lillie. His wife died July 11, 1884. Later he married Miss Sara J. Brown who survives him.

Brother Moody died April 8, 1913, at the age of 74 years. He served in the civil war about two years and was in several important battles, one being the seven days' fight at Richmond where he received a wound which resulted in the loss of a finger. He served all the time as a drummer. He was captured and taken to prison.

He professed faith in Christ and joined the Shady Grove Baptist

church at the age of 32 years. He served as a deacon in the church for about 20 years.

He leaves two children, Mrs. Ellen Elders and Mrs. Dovey Elders. Mrs. Lillie Green has been dead for several years.

He had 20 grand children and 24 great grand children.

He was a man of peace, showed great wisdom in settling disputes among his neighbors. He never had a suit in court in his life. The preachers and teachers found a welcome in his home; in fact none

were denied his hospitality.

Be it resolved:

1. That we realize and deplore our loss in the death of this useful Christian man; nevertheless we bow submissively to the will of our all-wise Father as he has seen fit to give him rest.
