

INDIVIDUALS AND TYPHOID

"When a person dies from typhoid fever these days it seems to me it's more or less a plain case of suicide," said a citizen of Raleigh recently. "Especially so," he continued, "in the face of all this anti-typhoid treatment that is being put before the people. I can't see why every person in the State doesn't avail himself of this opportunity to become immune to typhoid fever even though it hasn't been offered to every citizen free of charge. The State is doing all it can to get it to all the people practically without cost, but that's not the trouble. The people won't take it, free or not free. Why, right here in Raleigh where it has been offered free for every day in the week for four weeks, not half the people have taken it—not more than one-fourth have taken it."

"Of course, I don't mean when a person dies from typhoid that he prefers death to life but that he is responsible to the extent of his neglect or his indifference and ignorance. There may also be a community responsibility if that insanitary conditions were allowed to exist as the source of fever, but when such a preventive as this vaccine is put up to individuals, I do say they are to a great extent responsible when they come down with fever."

NEW CHRISTMAS SEAL.

Already the red cross seal movement for this year has started. The design of the seal has been made up and has been approved both by the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis and by the American Red Cross. It is expected that the proceeds from the sale of this seal this Christmas will be by far the largest that the history of the movement has ever known.

The anti-tuberculosis work that is carried on as a result of the sale of the Christmas seals has been defined by the conference of Red Cross Seal Agents as follows:

- (1) The construction of hospitals or sanatoria for the care of tuberculous.
- (2) The maintenance of the tuberculous.
- (3) The provision of day or night camps for the tuberculous; the provision and maintenance of dispensaries, visiting nurses, open air schools, fresh air classes, or preventoria for the care or treatment of tuberculous cases or for the prevention of the spread of tuberculosis.
- (4) The maintenance of educational or legislative activities which have for their object the prevention of infection with tuberculosis.
