BONDS OF LIBERTY

As Mr. McKee well said in the last issue of The Journal, Jackson had a larger proportion of voluntary enlistments than any county in North Carolina. These boys are not participating in the Third Liberty Loan. But for the excellent reason that they invested every dollar that they could spare from their pay in the second loan, last fall. The average monthly pay of the boys in the Camps, I would say, somewhere in the neighborhood of \$35.00. Practically every one of the Jackson county boys, along with multiplied thousands of others, bought from 1 to 5 fifty dollar bonds. It is indeed gratifying to the boys to read the list in The Journal of the subscribers to the Third Liberty Loan among the folks back home. It is substantial proof of the pledges made to us when we left last summer that you would back us to the last dollar.

But pleasing as is the success so far attained, it is not enough. We should every one hang our heads in shame if Jackson fails to go over the top with the full quota. If it were possible to bring home to every man and woman in the county the full significance of the war, what it means to every one of us and to our county, with a sense of personal responsibility, the quota of the county would be over subscribed, and Mr. McKee and the banks would have to hire extra clerks to take the subscriptions to the loan as they come pouring in.

It is not a question of whether the loan will be fully subscribed, but whether I have done my part. The fight on the Western front is still in progress with growing intensity, and we must all admit that it has been going too much in favor of the Germans. It only means that we have to take another notch in our belts, grit our teeth and renew our efforts. Every day the burden of the war will fall more heavily upon America, America, the land to which the world looks for the salvation of civilization, of democracy, of Christianity itself.

The boys are hurrying eastward to the western front as fast as trains and ships can carry them, and soon, we know not how soon, the boys who paraded the streets of Sylva that day last July will be numbered among those somewhere in France.

France and England must hold the Hun until until America gets into action, America must drive him back across the Rhine and rid the world for all time of Autocracy which would rule mankind with the rule of might.

The boys will turn the trick provided you will do your part. We are asked to meet the Hun on the field of battle. You are to lend your money to the government with interest at 4-1-2 per cent. If you fail us now, how can you look any member of the Army of Liberty in the face when that army returns from France triumphant in the greatest cause to which men have ever had the opportunity of dedicating themselves?

Last fall one of the organizations of the Old Hickory Division marching in the Liberty Parade had a banner with this inscription: "511 Men. 511 Bonds Sold. Do you expect us to fight the war and finance it too?" How about it? Where do you stand?

Prussia planned at one sweep to wipe out the progress that mankind has made toward freedom since the dawn of history and to enslave the world, which would plunge humanity back into the dark ages that followed the fall of Rome at the hands of the Huns. Your Magna Charta, your Declaration of Independence will be scraps of paper if Germany is victorious in this war. For every inch of ground that

Von Hindenburg gains, buy a bond. For every shell the Germans shoot across No Man's land, plant an acre. It is an effectual way of stopping the Huns. Every man must "do his damndest." And for the love of all that is holy, don't let the old county of Jackson be called and found wanting. If you believe in the boys that you have given to the cause back us with your money and your labor.
