#### OPPOSES CONSOLIDATION

Cedar Creek-

allow me space in your paper for a [ Ford truck on the Big Ridge read, few words, as I am a patron of the Glenville school, and am very much interested in the education of my children, and also others.

I live three miles from the Glenville school and there are other families who live between 3 and 4 1-2 miles from Glenville, who have to send their children to school or keep them at home.

We have been trying to get a school house up here so all our children could go to school during the cold weather.

There would be 36 children in 2 miles of this school who are out of the Glenville school limit.

But the board of education would n't aid us on the building or even give us a teacher if we built a house but gave us a Ford truck which doesn's give our children but half room when they are inside riding, and not out pushing, and carrying water to cool the engine.

It carries them down mornings very well when the roads are dry, but when a hard rain comes, or the winter months begin they average about one mile home of evenings and walk and push the rest of the way, and what time the truck was not out of commission and could not be cranked of mornings. The worst weather we had last winter the truck was frozen up or a broken spring, or no driver was he excuse ,and all who went to school walked, and then got home and hour sooner than if they had ridden in the truck.

I wish everyone of the Board of Education could drive over our road after the truck has been running one month, and see if he would not agree

For two miles distance on our road there are but 3 places the truck can turn, when it would meet the children going to school, the road is so narrow and rough.

During last October the roads got so bad that the truck could hardly go so we asked for some work on our road and our road men said they would give dollar for dollar if the patrons would work the road that way, so they did and that is about all the work our road get to amount to

anything last fall Please ask yourselves this question How can we pay school tax and then vote for higher ones and give free labor on the roads and have no school in reach of our children and have to suffer the uneasiness we do when we place our darling children in an oldtruck and start them 3 and 4 miles over a rough and narrow road, and not learn as much as they would in a little school house up here where

could get attention? We asked Mr. W. M. Fowler, one of the board of education, last fail, who was responsible for the lives of our children when we put them in that truck. He said the board of education was not, or either the truck drivers. Who is? Could the parents be responsible when they are opposed to this business as much as several

they are not crowded and each one

of us are? I consider that we are just gambling on the lives of our children just in order to have the name of a big school at Glenville and get nothing in return, unless we had settled teachers who do not allow sweethearts, note writing and courtship in the school, our children had better be at home, or we could add a little more to our high tax money and put

our children in a good school where they have order.

Don't think I object to a high school at Glenville or high taxes for such a school, but I absolutely object to these fairy tales of consolidation as we have had a fair example on Cedar Creek, unless we had a hard-surfaced road and wide enough to pass a team when yeu meet one, without getting down over the terday for their home in New Cartle. breast works of the road.
