Education at its regular meeting on
July 2nd, a county wide meeting of
the school committee was ordered
to be held with the County Board of
Education on Saturday July 21, be-
ginning at 9:30 o'clock.

This call is in accordance with
Act. 6, Sec. 73-a of the new school
law of 1923. Its purpose is to re-
organize the county school system
by redistricting and consolidation
so that a more advantageous school
system may be worked out.

views. After this meeting no changes
can be made under the law except in
accordance with this county wide
plan.
