STATE HEALTH BOARD TO CONDUCT CLINIC

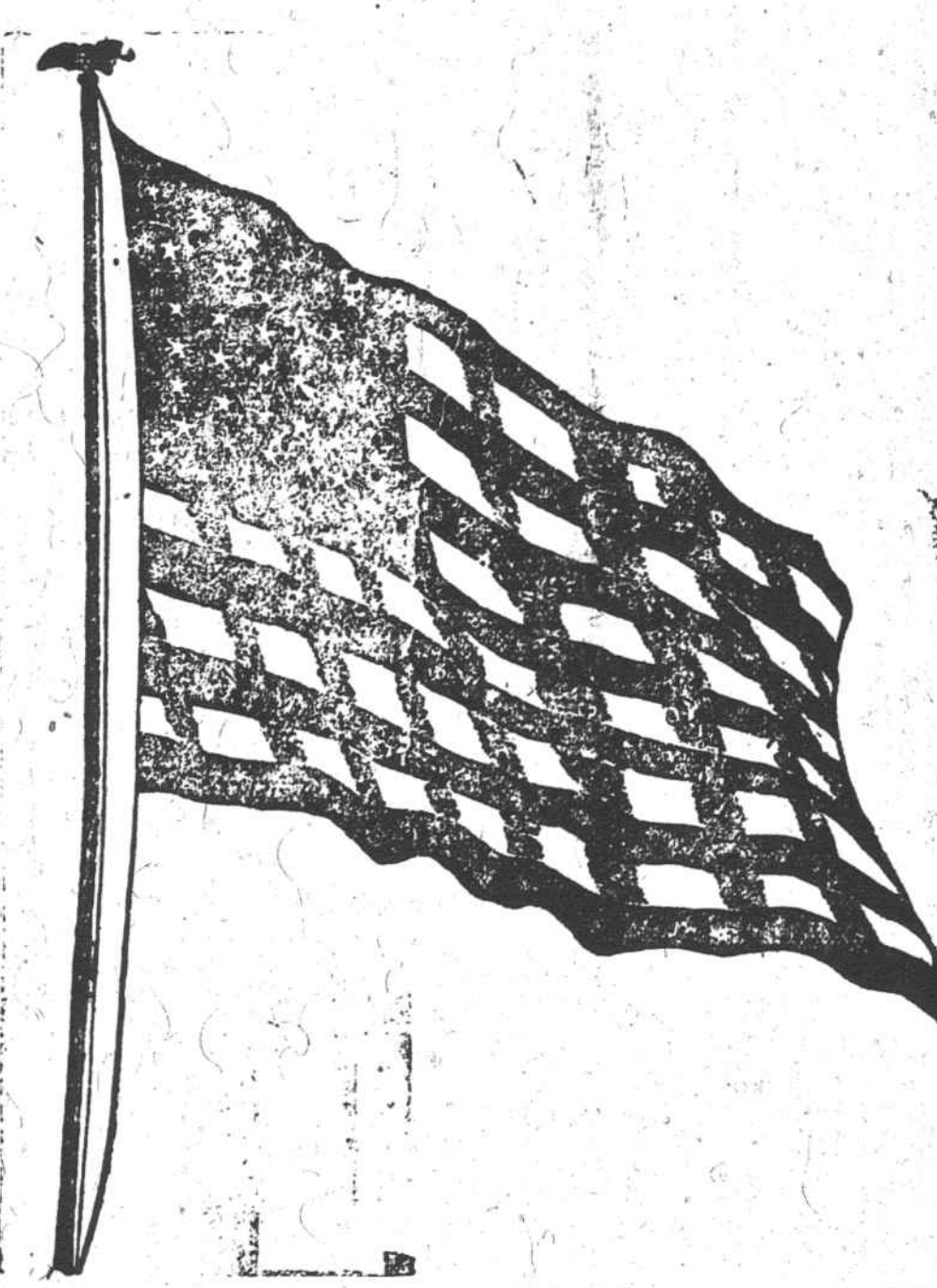
The state board of health will conduct an adenoid and tonsils clinic in the new Central High School Building, from July 22 to July 25. A competent physician will administer the anesthetic and a specialist will operate. A corps of twelve trained nurses will assist in the operating and care of the patients. A nominal fee of \$12.50 will be charged those able to pay, and totally free to needy cases. Those patients who desire to take advantage of this opportunity should notify Mr. O. S. Dillard or Miss Flora Ray, at once, at Sylva, and each person will be notified what day to attend the clinic and where to come.

COUNTY SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION TO MEET AT BETA 26TH AND 27TH

It is announced by officers of Jackson County Sunday School Association that the annual Convention will be held on Saturday and Sunday July 26 and 27, in the Baptist church Beta. Taking a prominent part on the program will be the following well known Sunday School workers: Miss Flora Davis, Raleigh, Associate Superintendent North Carolina Sunday School Association and Prof. D. W. Donaldson, Washington, N. C., Director of Religious Education Washington Collegiate Institute. In addition to these outside speakers a number of the most prominent pastors and Sunday School workers in the county will take part in the various sessions of the convention. In charge of the arrangements for the convention are Mr. H. C. Bryson and Mr. D. C. Bryson, President and Secretary of the County Sunday School Association. These officers are requesting the cooperation of all pastors, superintendents and other Sunday School leaders in the effort to make the convention a success. Following a plan started at the county convention last year, the officers have announced that again this year a pennant will be presented to the Sunday School having present in the convention the largest number of representatives sixteen years of age and over, according to the number of miles traveled. The number of representatives from each Sunday School will be multiplied by the number of miles from that church to the Convention Church, and the Sunday Schools in the county. The Sunday School with which the convention is held, and others within one mile, will not compete for the pennant.

TO HOLD W. N. C. EGG SHOW

Waynesville, July 3.—Widespread interest in the forthcoming "West-No-Ca" Egg Show to be held July 24-25 at the U. S. Veterans Bureau Training School Waynesville, is being created by a large number of solicitors who have been visiting many sections in the Land of the Sky to make known the details of this event, the first of its kind ever attempted in Western North Carolina. With several hundred dozen eggs already entered, the success of this show now seems assured, yet the students of the agricultural department of the school, under the auspices of which the exhibition is to be held, are determined to secure a record entry. "Dedicated to the production of better eggs in the Land of the Sky", is the slogan adopted by the organization in charge. It is the hope of the students that a show of this nature may become in the future a part of all poultry shows staged by the Western North Carolina Poultry Association, and similar organizations devoted to the advancement of the industry. Mr. B. H. Cole, formerly a commercial poultryman of New Jersey, has been secured ahead judge. All entries are to be made by number only until the judging has been completed, so that all will have an equal opportunity to win. Six handsome loving cups, gold and bronze medals, cash premiums and ribbons are being offered in four classes, as follows: commercial, fanciers, students, packers, and miscellaneous. Competition is open to everyone in all but the students class; in which only boys and girls attending graded and high schools of the section are eligible.
