The contract for paving the streets of Sylva, together with the necessary grading and water and sewer extension, was awarded, Tuesday, to The Foster Construction Company, of Yoh Wilkesboro for amounts aggregating \$134,701, for 1:24 concrete mixture. The next lowest bidder was E. T. Belote, at \$139, 128.50; with E. G. Wood hird tat \$141,349.

The paving to be done totals a little more than four miles in length, togehter with water and sewer extensions on some streets ..
