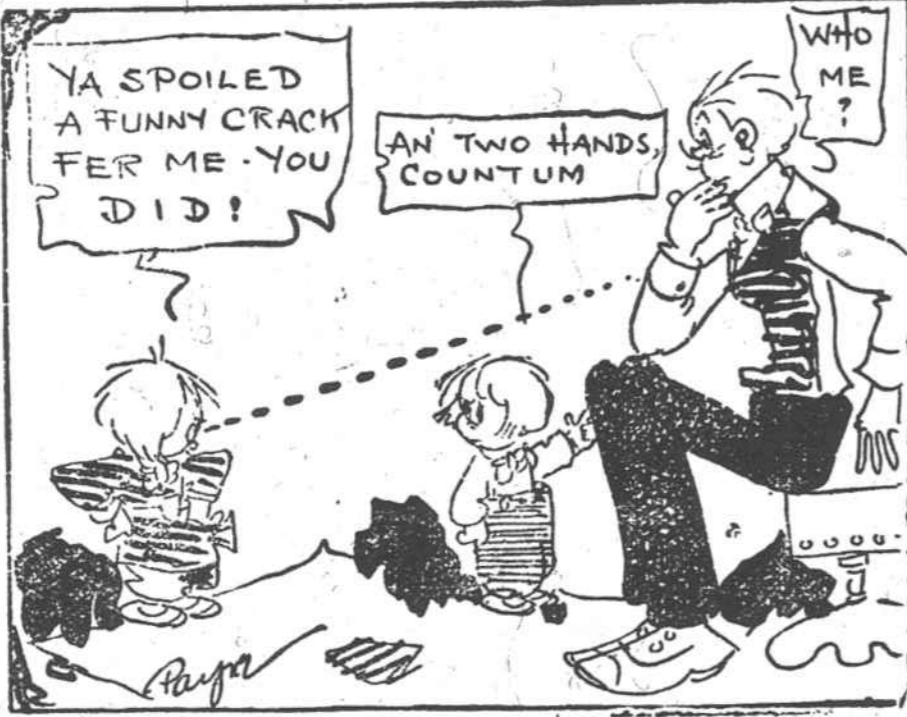

MADISON BOASTS CAROLINA'S BEST BROODER HOUSE

Marshall, N. C. May 10.—According to A. G. Oliver, poultry extension specialist of State College, Raleigh, the best brooder house he has seen in the State of North Carolina is located on the farm of Porter Bryan who lives in the Walnut Creek section, a few miles northwest of Marshall. Mr. Oliver inspected this brooder house on a recent visit to Madison county in the interest of poultrymen of this section.

Mr. Oliver based his statement on the following: Economical construction cost, sanitary surroundings and proper planning. The house is constructed of logs, chinked and whitewashed and the actual cost of building was very small. The house answers every requirement of the owner for ordinary purposes and is just as good as houses of more expensive

construction. County Agent Earle Britnall says that there are other good brooder houses in Madison county, but none of them were constructed as cheaply as that of Mr. Bryan.

WAYNESVILLE ALDERMEN AND MAYOR RE-ELECTED

In the election of town officers held at the Court House on Tuesday, the old board of aldermen consisting of the following men were re-elected after already serving two terms: Mr. Sam Jones received 398 votes; Mr. F. W. Miller received 405 votes; Mr. W. T. Shelton received 309 votes. Mr. M. H. Reeves, who was also running for alderman received 229 votes.

The race for Mayor was spirited with Major J. H. Howell victor over Mr. Atkins by 89 majority. Major Howell's votes were 282 and Mr. Atkins 193.

Unusually little interest was manifested in the election with a total of 528 votes cast.
