349 ENROLL AT CULLOWHEE

Cullowhee, June 15—President H. T. Hunter, at the formal opening of the Cullowhee State Normal School in the school auditorium, Wednesday morning welcomed the three hundred and forty nine students who have enrolled. Mr. Hunter announced that only lack of space prevented the summer school's being larger, as a number of students have been turned away because of inadequacy of housing facilities. A few students who have found rooms in the community are yet to be registered. The administration expects the registration to total about 360.
