ENGINEER KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Graham County News—Sunday afternoon, August 7, Mr. J. E. Curtis, 57, engineer on one of the London Highway Contracting company's road shovels met with a fatal accident when his car skidded over the bank of the new grade about one and a half miles below Robbinsville going down about twenty five feet to the edge of the river. The car turned over twice and was demolished.

Mr. Curtis was hurt internally and died the following Sunday morning at 1:15 o'clock.

He is survived by his wife and two daughters, Misses Jessie and Mae Curtis, of Gaffney, S. C., and by two sons, C. D. and Walter Curtis, of Buffalo, N. Y.

Mr. Curtis was a native of Gaffney, S. C., where he made his permanent home, coming here to work for the London Contracting and Road Building company, some time ago as an engineer on one of their road shovels. Since coming here he had made numerous friends and was well liked by all who knew him. His death will be mourned by his many friends who deeply sympathize with the family.

AGENTS TO GET PRIZES FOR HOG FEEDING WORK

Raleigh, N. C., August 30.—Two county farm agents in North Carolina will attend the International Livestock Show in Chicago next year with all expenses paid according to W. W. Shay, swine extension specialist at State College.

These prizes are offered by a firm of commission merchants in Richmond, Virginia, to the two agents making the best record in swine feeding work in their counties between October 1, 1927 and August 1, 1928. For the county agent to be eligible for the prizes, the work must be completed and the hogs sold between March 1, and October 1, 1928 inclusive.

"All feeding demonstrations started in any county between these dates will automatically be entered as part of the work of the agent in that particular county" says Mr. Shay. "Accurate records will be kept on all demonstrations and the results measured by the completeness of these records, together with the weight, cost and profit of the hogs shipped from each county."

Each demonstration will be judged on a percentage basis with emphasis being placed on quality rather than quantity, he states. The highest score made on any phase of the work will be given 100 percent, with the other records being based on their percentage to the perfect score.

Professor E. H. Hostetler, in charge of swine experimental work at State College, together with two other men selected by him will act as judges in the contest, states Mr. Shay.

Take care of your brood sow during the periods of flushing, gestation and farrowing and she will take care of you by farrowing large litters.

Why not build a modern poultry house to protect your flock this winter? Plans may be had free by writing the Agricultural Editor at State College.

Two hundred and eighty ears of hogs shipped out of the State the first six months of this year brought a total of \$405,925.73 to the owners. Yet some folks say there is no money in hogs.

All surplus vegetables should be canned and put up for use this winter. This "ounce of prevention" will do much toward keeping the doctor away.

Don't forget to clean and grease the working parts of all farm machinery before putting away this fall, advise agricultural engineers at State College.

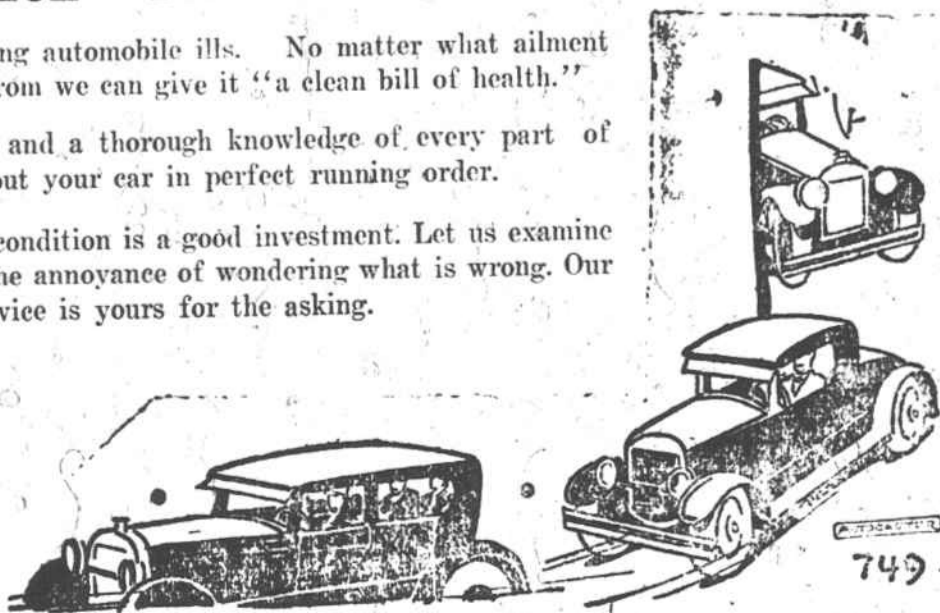
