DEMOCRATS NAME COUNTY TICKET

The Democrats of Jackson county, after the largest vote ever cast in a primary in this county, nominated John J. Maney for sheriff, Dan Allison for clerk of the superior court, Vernon Lee Cope for register of deeds, and John C. Allman for chairman of the board of county commissioners, on last Saturday. Maney received a majority of 343 votes over E. L. Wilson and A. C. Bryson.

Vernon Lee Cope fell short of a majority, but received a plurality of 19 over Adam Moses, the runner-up. Dan Allison's majority over Ed. Hooper, for clerk of the court was the closest race in the primary. He was given a majority of 19.

John C. Allman also fell short of a majority over John Deitz and Geo. Hooper, but received a plurality of 19 over Mr. Deitz, the runner-up in the race for chairman of the board of county commissioners.

An agreement had been reached between all candidates for county offices that no second primary would be called, and there will be none. Mr. Moses and Mr. Deitz have the legal right to call for a second primary, but neither of them will do so.

BYRON CARRIES COUNTY IN SOLICITORIAL PRIMARY

Thaddeus D. Bryson, of Bryson, N. C., carried Jackson County, in the solicitor of the 20th Judicial District, by a plurality of 24 over John M. Queen of Haywood, the runner-up.

The vote in this county was Queen, 26; Bryson, 790; James W. Ferguson, 529; Ralph Moody 245; Harry Cooper, 198.

Mr. Queen was the high man in the district, and Mr. Bryson the runner-up. It is thought that a second primary will not be called, though Mr. Bryson can do so.

The complete vote for the district in the solicitorial primary: Queen 2,387; Bryson 3,537; Ferguson, 2,961; Moody, 2,387; Cooper 754.

NEW REPUBLICANS VOTE IN SENATORIAL PRIMARY

Only 281 votes were cast in Jackson county in the first State-wide primary ever held by the Republican party in North Carolina.

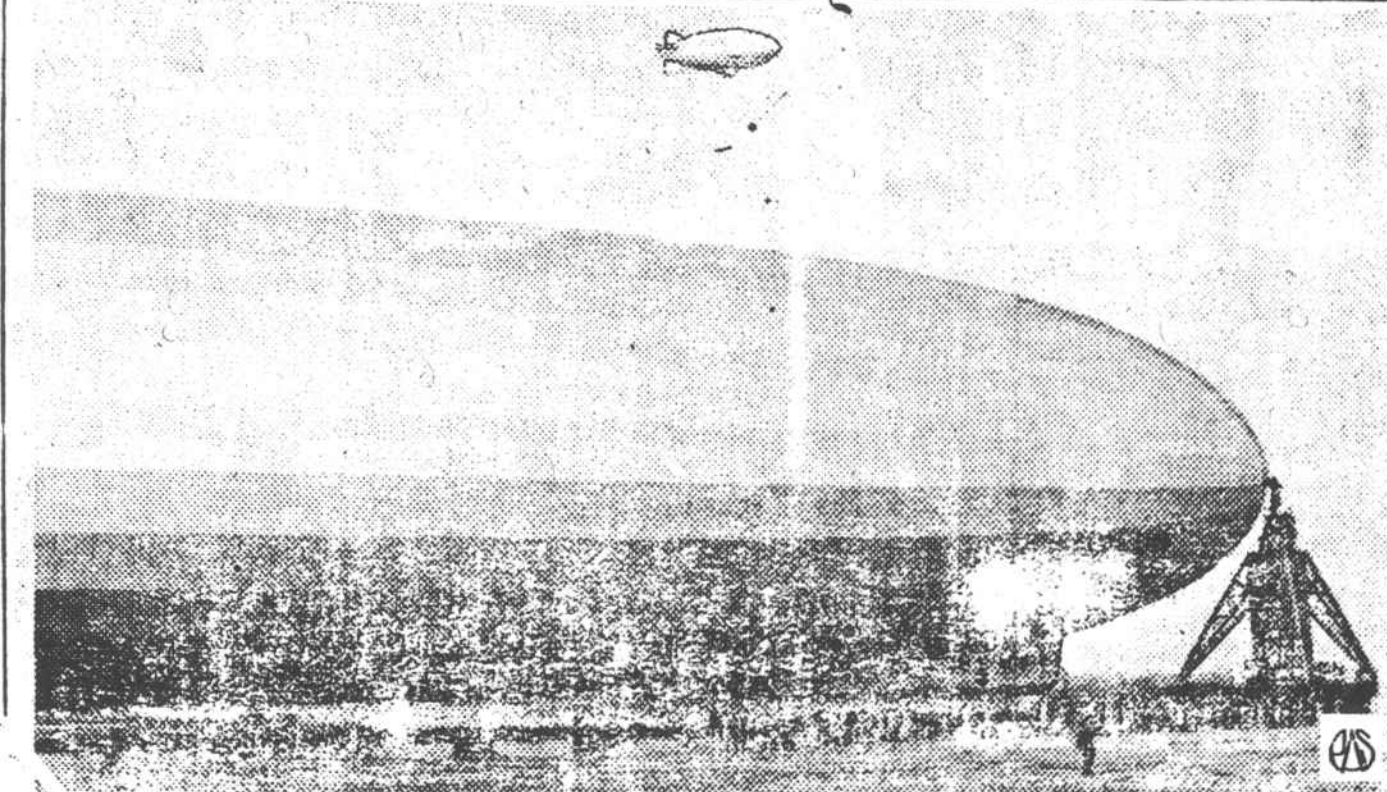
Of these Mr. Pritchard received 161, Major Butler 11, Irvin Tucker, and H. Grady Dorsett 2, giving Mr. Pritchard a majority of 245.

A very light vote was cast in the Republican box, throughout the State, the interest being taken by the voters of the party in the candidates.

With 1,457 of the State's 1,799, Mr. Pritchard, 4,152; and Rev. H. Grady Dorsett, who forced the primary by filing his name with the State Board of Elections, 1,137.

Representative Pritchard will oppose Mr. Bailey in the November election.

CUT SALARIES AT W. C. T. C.

President H. T. Hunter of Western Carolina Teachers' College has just revealed the action of the Board of Trustees in meeting the emergency of a 20 per cent cut made by the State Director of the Budget. Every institution and department in North Carolina has been advised that on account of a falling off of State taxes the appropriations made for 1930-31 must be cut 20 per cent. This means a shortage of nearly \$14,000 for Western Carolina Teachers' College. President Hunter states that every means was canvassed as a possibility of effecting the saving; but that the only way was to cut salaries of teachers and employees, and in addition, several employees have been eliminated, and the work of others combined.

The teachers and employees are meeting the situation in good spirit.

CULLOWHEE COLLEGE SUMMER SCHOOL ENROLLS OVER 300

Cullowhee, June 12— The enrollment for summer school at Western Carolina Teachers' College has reached above the three hundred mark, and others are still coming in. The dormitories are filled to overflowing and all available homes in the community are being occupied by the students. The community is co-operating with the president of the college by opening doors to assist in taking care of the overflow. President Hunter states that the new dormitory would easily have been filled if it had been completed.

The incoming students are not only large in number, but also in their viewpoint and seriousness of purpose. Mr. H. M. Hunt, acting registrar, noted the splendid personnel of the student body as he registered the young men and women from various sections of this and other States.

BAILEY CARRIES COUNTY 1990

Josiah W. Bailey, Raleigh attorney, carried Jackson county by 1990 votes over Senator F. M. Simmons, according to the official tabulation of the vote.

Senator Simmons received 254; Bailey, 2244; and Thomas L. Estep, running as a wet got 11 votes in the county.

Bailey led Senator Simmons in the State by approximately 70,000 votes. 1,702 precincts from which the vote has been counted, gave Bailey 197,078 and Simmons 128,081, or a lead for Bailey of 68,997.

Bailey strength developed pretty generally throughout the State, he receiving majorities in more than three-fourths of the counties; but it was the tremendous vote for him in the 25 mountain counties that swelled the majority to such large proportions.

For Corporation Commissioner, Pell received 1376 votes in Jackson county to 663 for Holloway, a majority of 713 for Judge Pell.

Mr. Simmons, overwhelmingly defeated by the Democrats in the primary, last Saturday, proves himself to be a worthy man, by making the statement that he will abide by the pledge he made when he entered the primary, and support Mr. Bailey. The 128,999 to 130,000 men and women who supported Mr. Simmons in the primary, are also honorable men and women. They too will support Mr. Bailey and the Democratic ticket. Dishonor lies not in defeat; but in going into a primary, either as candidate or voter, and then refusing to abide the result. The men women whose candidates failed of nomination, last Saturday, are men and women of honor. There will be no split in the Democratic party, this year, because the losers are not made of that kind of stuff. Democratic voters by the hundreds of thousands flocked to the polls on last Saturday, and voted for their choice. They are sportsmen and Democrats all, and the party is now united for the coming conflict.

Thomas L. Estep entered the Democratic primary as a wet. He received less than 2,000 votes in the entire State. Mr. Bailey and Senator Simmons, both dry, were given more than 325,000. That should settle the question, as to whether or not North Carolina Democracy is wet or dry.

Less than 40,000 votes were cast in the Republican primary in the State, last Saturday. It is due to indifference of the Republicans as to who their candidates are, or to lethargy in the party? Either way, it does not augur well for Republicanism in the State, this year.

Senator Moses' comment on the North Carolina primary was that "The Dutch have carried Holland".

BAILEY RECEIVES HUGE MAJORITY

J. W. Bailey received a majority of 19,544 over Senator Simmons in the Tenth Congressional District. The vote was: Transylvania, Bailey 1,523 Simmons 251; Haywood, Bailey 3,697 Simmons 1,446; Polk, Bailey 1,212, Simmons 374; Macon, Bailey 1,653, Simmons 316; Cherokee, Bailey 1,156, Simmons 169; Graham, Bailey, 1,016; Simmons, 115; McDowell, Bailey, 1,676; Simmons, 553; Henderson, Bailey, 1,848; Simmons, 475; Swain, Bailey 1,331, Simmons, 119; Buncombe, Bailey, 10,062, Simmons, 5,892; Jackson, Bailey, 2,224, Simmons, 1,254; Clay, Bailey, 540; Simmons, 41; Rutherford, Bailey, 3,327, Simmons, 1,736.

SIMMONS ENDORSES BAILEY

Senator Simmons, in a telegram to Col. John D. Langston, said: "I have no further statement to make, for I assume the people of the State know that I will keep the pledge I made when I entered the primary, and support Mr. Bailey".

Previously, Col. Langston, the Simmons campaign manager, had issued a statement in which he pledged his enthusiastic support to Mr. Bailey.

WEAVER CARRIES COUNTY BY A MAJORITY OF 1784

Former Congressman Zebulon Weaver carried Jackson county by a majority of 1784 over Major Wallace B. Stone in the Democratic primary, on Saturday. Mr. Weaver, who carried every county in the District by overwhelming majorities and secured the nomination with thousands of votes to spare, received 2,147 votes in Jackson county, while Major Stone was given 363.

HOOKE TO LIQUIDATE BANK

Judge Joseph J. Hooker, Sylva attorney, and the first president of the Tuckaseegee Bank, has been appointed by the corporation commission as liquidating agent to wind up the affairs of the Tuckaseegee Bank, to collect the assets and pay off the depositors.

In a statement posted in the window of the bank, Mr. Hooker asks the cooperation of its former patrons in liquidating the institution, which closed its doors in April.
