CHEERING MORTGAGE NEWS

Washington, D. C., September 7.—Perhaps the most widely cheering news that has come out of Washington in a long time is that there is to be a let up in the foreclosure of mortgages. It started when Franklin Fort, president of the newly created Federal Home Loan Bank organization, persuaded the Comptroller of the currency to telegraph instructions to all receivers of national banks ordering them to suspend all foreclosure proceedings. This was followed by an appeal to the various state bank superintendents, and practically all of them have agreed that forced sales under foreclosure proceedings for the realization of assets of failed banks will be suspended for sixty days or more while the Federal Home Loan Bank is being organized.

The Home Loan Bank expects to be in a position to lend up to 40 per cent of the appraised value on home properties, and so make it possible for home owners who are in distress to retain their homes.
