

SUPERIOR COURT WILL BEGIN HERE MONDAY MORNING

Judge P. A. McElroy, of Marshall will open the two weeks' term of February superior court in Jackson county next Monday morning.

A large criminal and civil docket awaits the judge, jury, and Solicitor John M. Queen.

The most important case now on the docket is that in which K. E. Bumgarner of Cashier's Valley charged with having shot Frank Bryson to death in Cashier's Valley on January 3. Bumgarner states that the shooting was done in self-defense. and after Bryson had attacked him with stones, cursed and abused him. and opened fire upon him with a rifle, as Burgarner was returning to his home.

The prominence of the families in volved makes the case one of intense interest in the county. Bryson was : son of Bob Bryson and a son-in-law of Alex Bryson, who lives on Highway 28, between Cashier's Valley and Highlands. Bumgarner is a prominent citizen of that end of the county, is also a member of one of Jækson county's oldest famili s. and a nephow of Judge Frix E. Alley.

That the survey on the end of **40 YEARS AGO** Highway 106 from Glenville to Cashier's Valley will start within two weeks, is the positive assurance of Tuckaseige Democrat Peb. 14, 1894 the Chairman of the State Highway and Public Works Commission, given Mrs. Hannah Hall, of Webster, to the editor of this paper, in Ra-

The mapping out of the Park to Park Highway, as planned by the North Carolina Highway Department, and submitted to the Civil Works Commission, in Baltimore last week, by Governor Ehringhaus, Senators Bailey and Reynolds, Chairman Jeffress, and other North Carolinians will begin this week, it is stated, and will enter North Carolina near Gaylax, Va., continue via Blowing Rock, Linville Falls, and Mt. Pisgah to the top of the Balsam range, thence across the tops of the Balsams to Balsam Gap, into the Plott Balsams, and to Soco Gap. #### W.C.T.C. SPONSORS TOURNEY FOR JACKSON COUNTY

Cullowhee, Feb. 14 .-- Western Carolina Teachers College will sponsor the first annual basketball tournament for Jackson County Friday and Saturday, March 2 and 3. There will be a high school and a graded school division. Rules and regulations governing the tournament are as follows:

1. There will be four divisions as follows: (a) High school girls; (b) high school boys; (c) graded school girls; (d) graded school boys.

2. Each high school in Jackson County may enter one girls' and one boys' team.

3. Each graded school in Jackson County may enter one girls' team and one boys' team.

4. Each boys' team will be limited to ten players and coach.

5. Each girls' team will be limited to twelve players and coach.

6. Each player must meet the following eligibility requirements: (a) He or she must have been a bon: fide student of the school represented since school opened in January, 1934: (b) He or she shall not be a pos' graduate; (c) he or she must b: passing at least three subjects; (d) In the high school division no player who has played as much as four years' high school basketball will b eligible.

7. Each school will bear its own expenses of transportation and entertainment.

8. There will be no entry fee.

9. The college will furnish officiala and balls.

10. Entries including list of players must he in the hands of C. C. Poindexter. Director of the tournament,
