**MANY PUMPS AND SCALES NEEDED ADJUSTING**

According to a report from O. L. Yates, State inspector of weights and measures, the weighing and measuring devices in Jackson county were badly in need of adjustment.

The gasoline pumps giving 23 1/2 inches per gallon are recognized by a white tag attached to them; those found to be giving less than the gallon are identified by a red tag. The scales that are not correct bear a green tag; those that are correct have no tag, and if they are not badly out of adjustment, they are condemned and a red tag is attached.

I know a lady who has been a cripple from childhood, unable to move about except in a wheelchair. She has never traveled more than a few miles from her home in a small Southern town. Years ago I heard her boasting her inability to get around and see the world. If she could do that, she thought, she could write stories.

A friend suggested to her that people were people and very much alike in their emotions and reactions anywhere in the world. Why not write stories about the people and scenes with which she was familiar.

My friend adopted the suggestion and began to write simple little fiction stories based on the people she knew. It took her a long time to master the technique of writing, but now, at sixty past, she is still earning \$10,000 a year with her pen.

Among some old papers which one of my New England neighbors found recently in an old trunk in the Wrens

loft were some interesting records showing the wages paid a hundred and eleven years ago to rural workers on the highway. Here are the figures:

For a man per day to the last day of July, 83 cents; from the last day of July to the last day of September, 67 cents; from the last day of September to the close of the year, 50 cents; for a team and four cattle and a cart to the last day of July, 74 cents; from the last day of July to the last day of September, 75 cents; from the last day of September to the close of the year, 56 cents; for a plough, 25 cents per day through the year.

Those rates per day were probably close to the rates now paid per hour. Of course they don't mean much unless they could be compared with the cost of commodities at the same time, but they are interesting as indicating how the scale of the ordinary man's earnings has gone up since 1824.
