Judge John M. Oglesby is dead at his Concord home, after a short illness, at the age of 49. John Oglesby acquitted himself well as a newspaper man, as a soldier, as a lawyer, and as a jurist. To some he may have appeared harsh at times; but he held a great reverence for law and order; loved his State devotedly; wanted it to be a safe place in which to live and labor and travel; and he demanded of others the same high conception of the duties and privileges of citizenship which he held. He entertained a keen sense of justice, and could not abide sham, pretense, or hypocrisy. If any defendant would deal fairly with his court, he would temper his justice with mercy. On the bench he was a dignified and stern judge. In private he was a pleasant gentleman and a most entertaining conversationalist. The Governor of North Carolina will have to search diligently if he finds another John Oglesby to place on the bench.

The people are indebted to the committees and leading spirits, who labored hard to please our guests.

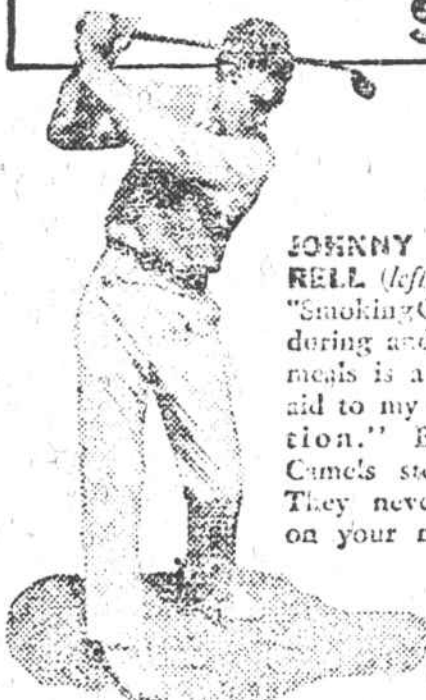

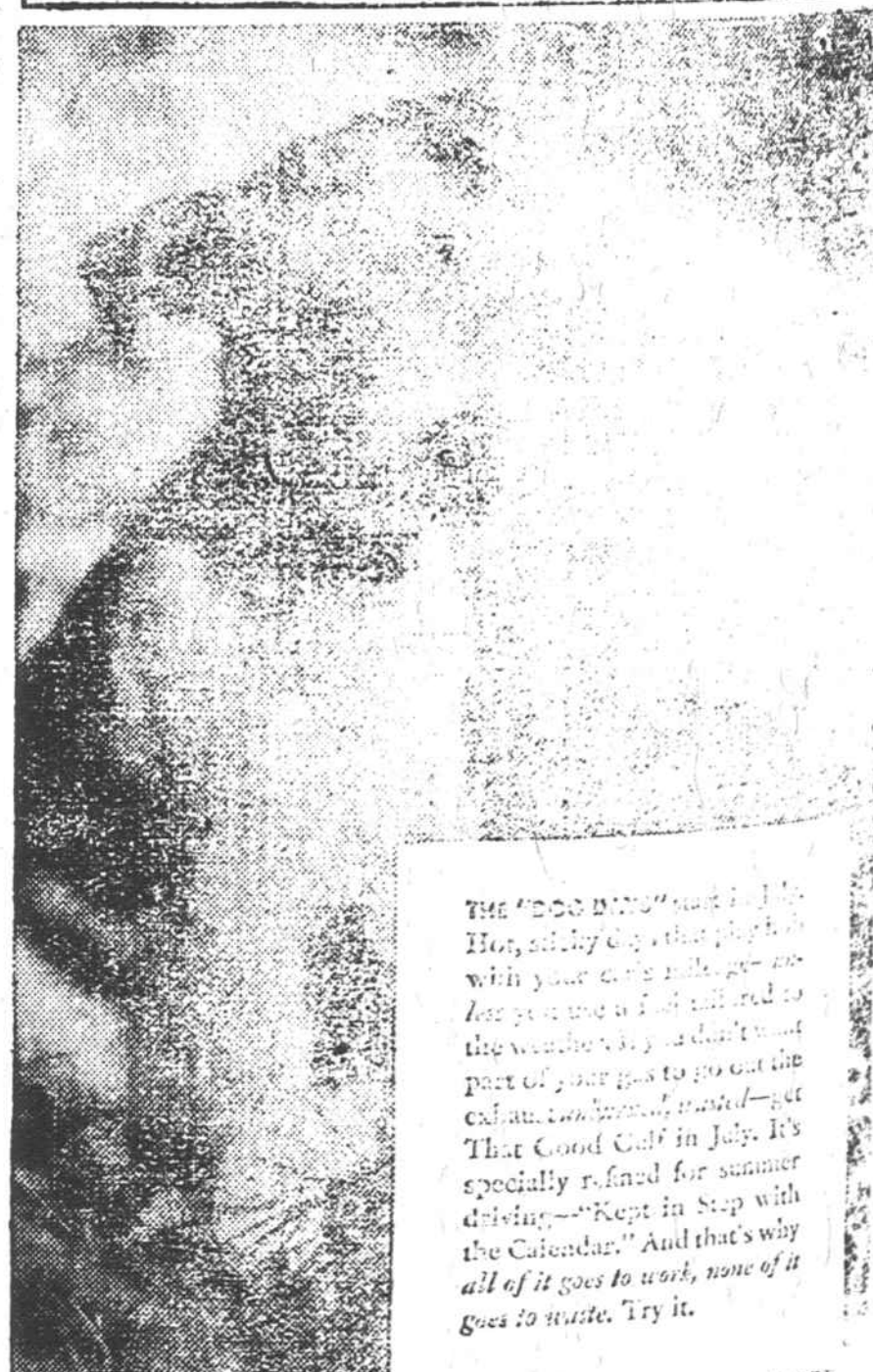
