If any defendant would deal fairly with his court, he would temper his justice with mercy. On the bench he was a dignifled and stern judge. In private he was a p'easant gentleman and a most entereaining conversationalist. The Governor of North Carolina will have to search diligently if he finds another John Oglesby to place on the bench.
