### Senate Favors Tax Relief

Most hated of all New Deal Tax measures has been the undistributed profits and capital gains clauses in the current revenue structure and both of these tax provisions have been retained in the new bill, though in a modified form. Observers who claim to be able to read the Senatorial wind are predicting that the Senate Finance Committee will recommend the complete repeal of the undistributed profits tax and further reduction of the capital gains tax, and that the Senate will do what its Committee recommends.

The ultimate outlook for the President's reorganization plan is still obscured by fog as to details but it is believed here that certain groupings of executive functions, generally conceded to be necessary in the interests of economy, will be authorized but that the broad powers sought by the President will not be granted

and that the proposal to change the civil service system and do away with the present functions of the Controller-General in passing upon the legality of Federal expenditures before they are spent will not be approved.

### Forecast GOP Gains

Political prophets are beginning to be more specific in their predictions. It is conceded privately, even by the most ardent Democrats, that the Republicans will gain between 40 and 60 additional seats at this year's elections, giving them around 140 members of the lower House instead of their present 90. That would still leave the Democrats with a two-to-one majority.

Professed readers of the Presidential mind, of whom there are many who seldom read it correctly, represent Mr. Roosevelt as being reconciled to letting political events take their natural course as well as keeping hands off Congress.
