Jones is building a store house on Depot Square, which is to be occupied by L. C. Hall, of Sylva. Our bridge is all that is now lacking to have one of the best little places on this line of railroad.

Last Tuesday afternoon, about 3 o'clock D. Zeb Dillard was almost instantly killed by an extra train, west bound. The tragedy occurred just above town on the main road leading from Sylva to Haywood county. Mr. Dillard was one of our best farmers and by his energy and skill had accumulated quite a nice estate. He was 54 years old and leaves a wife, and twelve children and a large number of relatives and friends. . . . Messrs. Wells and Wilson have just made a picture frame from lumber out of the old Siler residence, at Franklin that is at least 100 years old. This lumber was cut by the Cherokee Indians and the frame now contains the picture of the present tribe of Cherokee Indians now in this county and Swain. . . . Last Sunday morning at 11:30 was perhaps one of the pleasantest and most enthusiastic crowds ever seen in the Methodist church at this place. The commodious building was filled to its utmost capacity. The occasion was to hear the sermon to the Knights of Pythias of Sylva. Rev. Baylus Cade, of Shelby, delivered this special sermon. The musical program for the service, arranged by Rev. C. H. Neal was one of the finest selections of music ever rendered in this town on such an occasion: Hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name", by congregation; Scripture Reading, "It Was Spoken for the Maser", by the choir; Offertory, by the orchestra; Quartette, "Scatter Seeds of Kindness, Misses Grindstaff and Cathey, Messrs. Gray and Neal; sermon, by Rev. Baylus Cade; song, "The Lights of Home". . . . The 44th anniversary of the Knights of Pythias was very appropriately celebrated in Dillsboro, on Wednesday night, by the members of the order at that place. The principal feature of the evening was an address by Hon. Marshall Bell, of Murphy. Those who went down from Sylva were Knights E. B. McDade, H. E. Hampton, C. C. Buchanan, B. C. Grindstaff, C. L. Allison, H. O. Curtis, Jno. Parris and W. E. Tustin. . . . Norton: On measuring the snow, it is found to be 22 inches deep. . . . Some of our oldest citizens in Jackson county say this has been the coldest winter and the most snow they have seen in many years. . . . 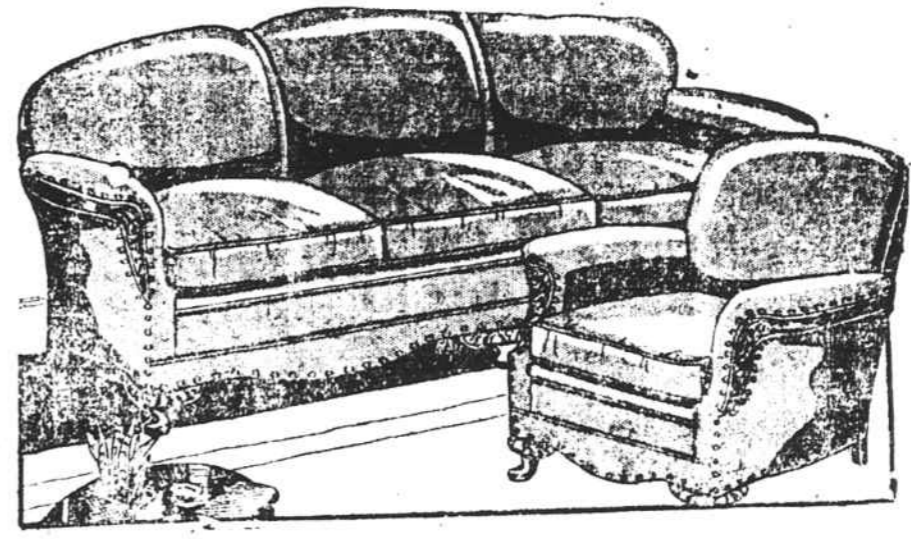

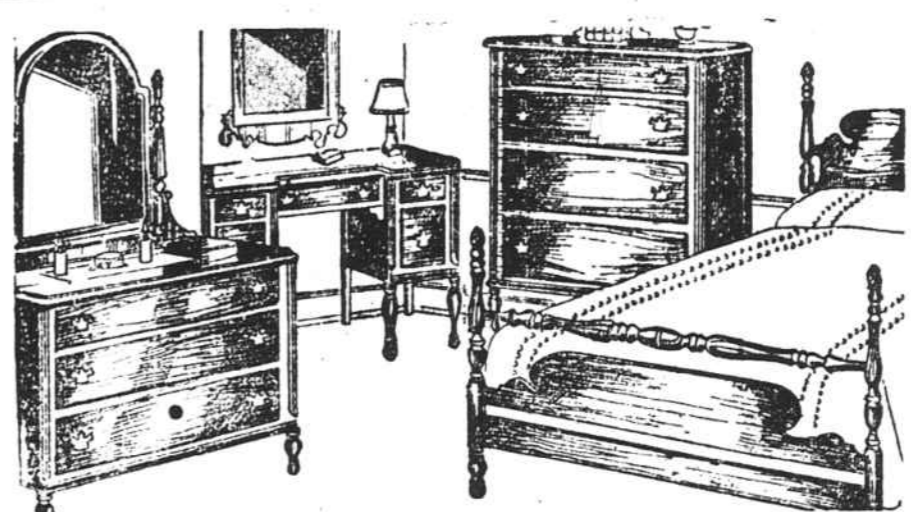

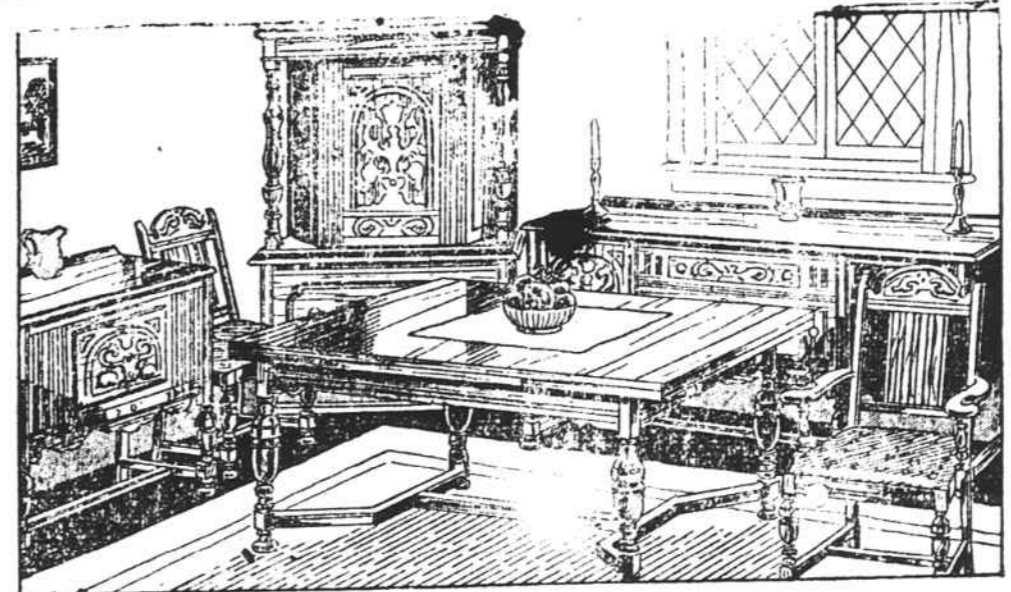
