State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

Question: What causes the milk from my cow to separate into three parts after it is churned—the clabber at the bottom, the water in the middle and the cream on top with not much butter at all?

Answer: Such difficulty in handling milk often happens in extremely hot weather. It is usually no fault of the cow or her feed. If you will place the milk immediately after milking in the coldest water available and keep the milk and cream cold by changing the water occasionally, it should help to remedy this trouble. It is best not to place it in a refrigerator or ice box until after cooling the milk in water. It is also important to give the milk utensils an extra good scalding, using baking soda in the hot water, to kill bacteria in warm weather.

President And Canada's Prime Minister Discuss International Defense

the capital of that country. The British, however, insist that this was not a serious setback to them, as their defenses of the Red Sea and the Suez Canal have in no way been endangered. They have severely bombed Italian concentrations in Ethiopia and still maintain control of both ends of the Mediterranean, keeping open the life line of the Empire.

The Royal Air force has repeatedly bombed German concentrations, oil depots, and factories in Germany proper and in the German-occupied portions of France, Belgium and Holland.

Mr. Churchill, speaking in calm confidence, told Commons that the British losses so far have amounted to only 92,000 killed, wounded and missing. He pictured Britain as the defender of freedom for all Europe and the champion of Democracy for the world, and expressed his confidence that the Empire will win the war and set the enslaved peoples of Europe at liberty. In America, the debate on the subject of conscription of men drags wearily on, with the Isolationists in the Senate opposing bitterly the passage of the bill. Also, the Senate was told one of the things that is holding up National Defense is the refusal of certain big manufacturers to cooperate, because the profits are not large enough to suit them.
