Draft Board Is There will be no Democratic

primary for the nomination of officers of the town of Sylva, and there will be no opposition to the Democratic ticket in the general town election to be held on May 6. These statements became assured facts when the fifteenth of April passed and but one candidate for each town office was filed with Charles M. Reed, the town clerk.

At the beginning of the filing period, H. Gibson, the present mayor, filed for reelection, and W. T. Wise, W. J. Fisher, Walter L. Jones, W. E. Grindstaff and S. A. Carden filed as candidates for aldermen. Mr. Wise, Mr. Fisher and Mr. Jones are members of the present board.

There has never been a Democratic primary for the nomination of officers for the town; but this is the first time since the custom of holding partisan elections in Sylva was begun, that no Republican or bi-partisan opposition has been in the field.

The election will be held on May 6, with Ben N. Queen as registrar, and Dan Tompkins and W. D. Warren as judges. The vote is expected to be extremely light; but under the North Carolina law an election must be held, giving every qualified voter an opportunity to cast his ballot.

This is not the first time in Sylva's history that but one ticket was in the field. It has happened more than once before; but this was when a ticket composed of both Democratic and Republicans had been agreed upon by leaders of the two major parties.


