Howard R. Garriss, Extension Immune and resistant varieties plant pathologist of N. C. State College, reports that a large number of samples of diseased pecans have been sent to his office this fall, and they continue Saba, Georgia, Delmas, Van to come in every few days.

In answer to these requests ton. for recommendations for control nearly every case the samples received were found to have the pecan scab disease. It is too late to correct this trouble in the current crop of nuts. But there are several ways to curtail or prevent damage to future crops."

The Extension specialist said that certain varieties of pecans are resistant to the scab, while others are susceptible to attack.


