## THE BOND INTEREST.

"All taxes which shall be levied upon and collected from said railroad company by any county, city, town or township under the general revenue acts as from other citizens and property, upon any real or personal property belonging to said corporation and situated within said county, city, town or townships, shall be set aside as a distinct fund and applied exclusively by the proper authorities thereof, if said county, city, town or township shall have subscribed to the capital stock of said company and issue bonds in payment thereof, to the liquidation and payment of the interest accruing on said bonds issued on account of such subscription so long as said bonds shall be outstanding and remaining unpaid."

## PROGRESS OF SURVEY.

Notes from the Leader's Correspondent in Camp with the Brunswick, Western & Southern R. R. Survey Corps.  
IN CAMP, TOWN CREEK, NOV. 16.—Our surveying corps encamped here at first, and dividing into two parties here started towards Southport and Wilmington. The Southport survey is in charge of Chief Engineer Dougherty and J. H. McCree, the Wilmington in charge of Walter G. McRae and L. G. Cherry. I am with the Southport party and we expect to reach your city within ten days. Mr. Geo. H. Cannon, has entertained our parties with great hospitality, and is enthusiastic for the railroad which will give life and prosperity to Brunswick county.

The people here are all for the road. Our line from here crosses the Wilmington & Georgetown road near the ten mile post, then towards Wilmington. The Southport line at Town Creek crosses the "Sawpit," the Wilmington & Georgetown road near twelve mile post, then South 20 degrees East, direct for Southport. The weather has been very favorable.

L. Stevens, of the LEADER, who bid \$500, which was quickly followed by one of \$525 by Dr. Curtis. After a bid of \$700 Mr. Stevens dropped out, Dr. Curtis raising it to \$750. This bid was followed by one of \$775 by Mr. W. H. Pyke. The lot was finally knocked down to Mr. Pyke for \$885.
