Moore Court.

The August term of Moore Superior
Court began on last Monday, and will
probably continue for two weeks.
His Honor, Judge Graves, presides.
Court opened shortly after the arrival
of the train which brought the Judge.
Mr. E. Waddill was appointed foreman
of the Grand Jury, and Mr. John F.
McDonald, the officer in charge. His
Honor charged the Grand Jury at
length, in a plain and instructive
manner, reciting and describing what
acts constitute crimes and misdemean-
ors.

The attorneys in attendance on Mon-
day were Messrs. Franklin McNeill,
Solicitor, of Rockingham, M. S. Robins,
of Asheboro, W. D. McIver and W.
H. McNeill, of Troy, A. P. Gilbert, of
Ore Hill, A. A. F. Seawell and W. E.
Murchison, of Jonesboro, J. W. Hins-
dale, of Raleigh, A. L. McNeill, of
Sanford, James D. McIver, J. C. Black,
W. J. Adams, W. C. Douglass, T. J.
Shaw, C. A. McNeill, N. M. Dunlap,
McI. Kennedy, of Carthage.
We noticed one little circumstance

somewhat unusual. Mr. J. C. Camp-
bell, Attorney at Law, was drawn up-
on the Grand Jury, and is still serv-
ing.

There were 71 cases on the criminal
docket, at the opening of Court, and
168 on the civil issue docket, with 20
on the summons docket. There were
seven prisoners in jail, 5 or 6 of them
awaiting trial for larceny.

The crowd in attendance on Monday
was unusually large, and it was ex-
pected that on yesterday and today it
would be much increased.
