COMMUNICATIONS.

(Correspondence of the LEADER.)

Moore Superior Court.
 The October term of the Superior Court of Moore County, convened on Monday at ten o'clock, His Honor, Jesse F. Graves, on the bench. The Grand Jury was drawn and sworn, M. J. Blue, Esq., being selected as foreman of that body.
 After charging the Grand Jury in a full and instructive manner the court proceeded to the dispatch of general routine business. A considerable amount of work has been done up to the hour of this writing.
 There are present no visiting members of the Bar other than those who usually attend. There has been no case of special importance heard. The homicide case, in which McInnis is defendant, will be called Wednesday, and if tried, the original docket will not be closed until Friday, and perhaps later. There are sixty-three cases upon it, one hundred and ninety-two on the civil docket, and on the appearance docket.
 There is a smaller crowd here than I have ever seen at this court, and the people are more orderly and better behaved than they usually are. Very few drunken men are seen in and around the court house.
 Court will probably be held next week, but the jury for that week have been notified (or are to be notified) not to attend before Wednesday morning, so that they may be at their precincts on election day, if they desire.
 The board of magistrates met in the court house to-day, (Tuesday), at the noon recess, and elected Capt. Daniel O'Bryan, of Jonesboro Township, a member of the Board of County Commissioners, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of J. J. Partridge. They also declined to establish an Inferior Court for the county.
 Scurlock, colored candidate for Congress, spoke in the court house Monday night. His speech is spoken of as having been quite temperate and conservative.
 The janitor of the court house complains that somebody pulled the bell rope so hard as to move the bell from its fastenings and jeopardize the life of the ringer. They were determined to be heard.

Trinity College.
 OCTOBER 1890.
 Professor Alderman lectured here last Saturday, on Public Schools. He lectured for two hours in a style of rare merit. Among other things he said that only six out of every one hundred applicants received first grade State certificates, which is an evidence that poor salaries necessitate the employment of inefficient teachers, as those who are well qualified for teaching either seek more remunerative employment or go to States where good teachers are in demand. He said that most of the public school teachers are from the farms, which is an evidence of increasing intelligence among the agricultural classes.
 The average school term in North Carolina is forty days, (or two months), while in Texas, where the farmers are thoroughly organized, the average term is about six months. Any class of people well organized, will look after the betterment of their educational advantages.
 The meeting held by the Y. M. C. A. here last week, resulted in the conversion of ten students. The present senior class, composed of twelve, has but two unconverted boys in it, and they manifested a desire, during the meeting to lead a new life.
 The University of Pennsylvania Boat Ball Team has accepted a challenge to play Trinity Team in Philadelphia, November 19th. This will be a new departure for Trinity, as she has never gone across Mason & Dix-

on's line to play a match-game. The University of Virginia wants to play a match-game with Trinity, and in their challenge they say they want to play some games north; therefore, they want some practice. Our Captain says the object of our team is not to give other teams practice.
 A student in Theology was asked by a Professor what is an evangelist? After meditating for a moment he said: it is all about every where-preached-ness.

Death of Mrs. Walker.
 The death of Mrs. A. B. Walker startled our community. To many of our readers she was well known, and wherever known was esteemed. She was a woman of rare genius and exceptional qualities. To appreciate her, it was necessary to know her.
 When known, she developed to the observer and enquirer, a witness which, upon first acquaintance, might not be apparent.

Nigger Scurlock.

We will notice a little of it: He said North Carolina was poor, and behind the times, because she persisted in being a Democratic State. Said the State is Democratic because the orators in that party were constantly appealing to the passions of the large number of poor, ignorant, uneducated white people the State contains! Think of it, white folks. What an ignorant wretch! A man whose race is being educated and held up by the aid of white people's money, charging ignorance to those same white people!
