### Ingalls May Yet Win.

TOPEKA, Kansas, Jan. 17.—The Farmers' Alliance, in caucus Thursday night, decided to unseat seven republican members of the lower House and seat the seven Farmers' Alliance candidates. When this fact became known the republicans met and it is said decided to adjourn the Senate on the very day that the republicans of the lower House were unseated. The adjournment will be sine die, and will prevent the holding of a joint session for the purpose of electing a U. S. Senator. The choice of a Senator to succeed Mr. Ingalls will then devolve upon Governor Humphrey, who, it is said, will name Mr. Ingalls to succeed himself.—State Chronicle.

## General News.

It is said 80,000 Jews have reached Jerusalem from Russia since December 31st.

Several cities in Virginia and Georgia celebrated Gen. Lee's birth-day on the 19th, which is a legal holiday, in those States.

There was a collision of two passenger trains on the W. N. C. R. on the 18th instant, but fortunately no one was seriously hurt.

The Chronicle says that Dr. W. J. Hawkins left on the 19th for his orange grove in Florida. It will be some time yet before we leave for ours.

It is reported that Governor Fowle has telegraphed the Governor of South Carolina to ascertain whether cannon cannot be obtained to use against the oyster pirates.

Several of our best legislators are racking their brains to devise some sure means of increasing currency circulation in our midst. Success to them each and all.

The cold is intensely severe in Germany. Rivers are blocked with ice which has to be blasted to relieve imprisoned vessels. Even deer in the forest are dying.

Jack Dempsey, whoever he is, has been badly used up in a prize-fight in New Orleans. His nose was broken, his ribs bruised and his neck saved, whether the latter was providential or not we leave our thinking readers to judge.

Tilla Grady and his daughter-in-law, of Wake county, were arrested a few days ago and lodged in jail upon suspicion of poisoning Tilla Grady's wife. They were released by Judge Clark, upon habeas corpus, in bail of \$100 each.

Ex-Sheriff, Clint Rogers, of Granville county, who is accused of having murdered, by poisoning, one W. F. Parker, a white man, and Brock Bailey, a colored man, has been released upon bail by his Honor, E. T. Boykin, upon a writ of habeas corpus.

So also has been the wife of the deceased white man, she having been imprisoned by the committing magistrate for complicity in the murder.

The bail was fixed at \$10,000 for each. Granville court convenes January 25th, until which time our readers must wait for developments, or secure their information from some other journal, as the published reports seen by us to differ, in some particulars so materially that we prefer to omit details for the present.

The great historian George Bancroft, is dead. He passed away, at his home in Washington, D. C., on the 17th inst. His illness was brief. He was born at Worcester, Mass., October 3d 1800. His first volume of history was published in 1834. He was once nominated Governor of Massachusetts, and was made Secretary of the Navy under President Polk.

He was besides, at different times, Minister to Great Britain, Russia and Germany.

He was about ninety-one years old, at his death.

His works will live after him.

### The Best Grapes.

Benjamin G. Smith, of Cambridge, Massachusetts, writes to Garden and Forest, that after cultivating fifty-five varieties of hardy grapes, one vine each, in order to ascertain the best varieties for family use, the following, ripening in the order named, are the twelve most approved in his family: Lady, Moore's Early, Cottage, Eumelan, Worden, Wilder, Barry, Brighton, Massachusetts, Lindley, Prentiss and Iona.

Although in a city lot, the vines are set eight and ten feet apart in eight feet rows. The grounds are under-drained and sub-soiled, and manured with only cow manure, ground bone and wood ashes. The vines are laid down in November.
