General News.

An unbroken line of levees from the mouth of the Mississippi to Middle Arkansas will soon be completed if rains do not interfere.

Half a million dollars were staked on the Dempsey-Fitzwilliam fight in New Orleans. Dempsey was knocked out in the thirteenth round.

Mr. E. F. Moore, former President of the Peoples' National Bank at Fayetteville, was arrested on Monday last upon warrant of a United States Commissioner, charging him with embezzling \$106,000.
